# **ALAC Chair and ATLAS III Update**

The Third At-Large Summit (ATLAS III) will start officially on 4 November 2019, soon after the Welcome Ceremony (evening of 3 November). However, ATLAS III participants who are in Montreal on Sunday, 3 November are invited to attend a brief reception to be informally welcomed to Canada and the ICANN meeting. This event will be held at the Double Tree Hotel. The subsequent programme beginning on Monday consists of a daily Plenary related to the leadership aspect of the ATLAS III programme and Break-out sessions that focus on the policy development process. Interspersed among these important and specifically planned ATLAS III sessions, there are times when At-Large will join the rest of the ICANN community at High Interest Topic and other ICANN-related sessions. High Interest topics include: EPDP (The Expedited Policy Development Process on GDPR) Phase 2 on Monday - which will be of special interest to ATLAS III participants; DNS Abuse is on Wednesday @ 10:30am. This is also the topic that the ALAC will raise with the ICANN Board on the same day @ 3:45 pm as an important Internet end-user issue; and finally the FY21 Annual Operating Plan and Budget, as well as the 5-year Operating and Financial Plan @ 1:30pm. This topic is what the Board has asked for some feedback from the ALAC at the joint ALAC-Board meeting. Other sessions on Tuesday that will be of interest, to help ATLAS III participants understand how another ICANN Advisory group operates will be the joint ALAC-GAC joint session @ 2:15pm, followed by the GAC-Board meeting at 3:15pm.

The ALAC will be holding its Working Sessions on Saturday and Sunday. I will be at a meeting with other SO-AC Chairs, the CEO and Board Chair on Friday, and I have a one-on-one meeting with the Board Chair on Thursday afternoon, so my meeting week starts early. But I am really looking forward to the ATLAS III event, I would also add that despite the issues relating to visas, the ICANN Org is working on ensuring that there will be remote participation available for those who are unable to attend. While Plenaries will not be an issue because full interpretation service will be provided, these services for the breakout groups may be somewhat limited. If you are wanting the attend the event remotely, please notify Gisella Gruber and Heidi Ullrich (staff@atlarge.icann.org) to ensure that you get the information required for all remote participation services. Unfortunately because they are in real-time we will be unable to cater for different timezones. Remotely attending ATLAS III participants will have their attendance and participation recorded against the expectations of the ATLAS III completion certificate and presentation of the ATLAS III Ambassadors pin. Take care as you travel to Montreal, or if in your home situations, we hope you will join us remotely.

#### The ALAC ratified one statement in October:

Next Steps to Improve the Effectiveness of ICANN's Multistakeholder Model The ALAC summarized its comments as follows:

I. Strengthen ICANN's bottom-up multistakeholder decision-making process and ensure that work gets done and policies are developed in an effective and timely manner.

- Issue 1: Prioritization of work. ALAC feels this must be addressed (Category A).
   Some suggestions include: spreading the workload, increased outreach (ATLAS III, further incentives to keep contributing volunteers, adequate knowledge and resources (specified in II) The entire community, as well as ICANN.org [icann.org] must contribute to the resolution of this problem.
- Issue 2: Precision in scoping the work. This issue may fall into Category A must be addressed or Category B -- might be partially addressed in current
  processes. We foresee scoping that is tight and smart and relevant to the
  process. It is impossible to say who should be responsible when so much
  activity around it is unresolved.
- Issue 3: Efficient use of resources. This is a category A issue which must be addressed. We recognize that it might be partially addressed by current processes but cannot assess the situation until these processes are completed. We are concerned that PDP 3.0 may offer efficiency at the cost of inclusiveness which we feel would be a backwards step in the evolution of ICANN's MSM.
- Issue 4: Roles and responsibilities and a holistic view of ICANN. This is a
  category A issue although it will require further processes to resolve. ALAC
  seeks a bottom-up review of roles and responsibilities as an independent
  process.

II. Support and grow active, informed and effective stakeholder participation.

Strategies to expand the concept of participation are offered as well as various resources and support needed to ensure informed participation. We consider this to be a Category A issue -- the model cannot evolve if it is not addressed. This is a major concern for At Large and other volunteer-based constituencies and all will need to be involved in addressing it. Support from ICANN, org and the Board will be necessary.

Issue 5: Representativeness and inclusiveness. Mentorship programs are a
key part of ensuring that the MSM system remains representative and
inclusive. Relevant constituencies as well as staff need to make sure these
programs are working as they are intended and that they are reaching the right
demographics. Inclusiveness at the leadership level needs to be improved
through a bottom up process with staff assistance.

III. Sustain and improve openness, inclusivity, accountability and transparency.

 Issue 6: Culture, trust and silos. This is a category A issue that needs to be addressed in this process. All constituencies need to reach across their boundaries, respect for other viewpoints must be reinforced. This is a problem in many large organizations and there are professional services available to help

- build trust and cooperation. By engaging some of these services, ICANN.org [icann.org] could help constituencies build a better working environment.
- Issue 7: Complexity. This is an inherent feature of ICANN work, but where it can be alleviated, ICANN.org [icann.org] should take the lead. Make sure information such as the website is well organized and understandable and closely monitor the internet governance environment for issues that will impact ICANN directly.
- Issue 8: Consensus. Creating conditions that would facilitate consensus is the goal of the issues already listed. Preserving the voice of end users in the decision-making processes is crucial to ICANN's MSM model -- a Category A issue in which all parties play a role but the role of the Board will be particularly important.

### **ICANN Update**



ICANN66 will take place 2-7 November.

#### This month, ICANN:

- Participated in the Fourth <u>Eastern European DNS Forum</u> held in Yerevan, Armenia from 11-12 October and co-organized by .am/.hu

   Registry, <u>ISOC.AM</u>
- Published the <u>Age Diversity and Participation Survey</u>
- Released the <u>Recommendations for the Technical Utilization of the Root Zone</u>
   <u>Label Generation Rules</u> by the Root Zone Label Generation Rules Study Group
   (RZ-LGR SG)
- Published a paper "<u>Local and Internet Policy Implications of Encrypted DNS</u>" that highlights some emerging standards related to the domain name system such as DNS Over TLS (DoT), DNS Over HTTPS (DoH), etc.

There is a <u>call for expressions of Interest (Eols) for the At-Large Board Member Position 2019-2020 Cycle</u> by 11 November.

Applications are invited <u>for ICANN67 Community Childcare Grants Pilot Program</u> by 20 November and <u>ICANN Academy 2020 Leadership Program</u> scheduled for 5-6 March in Cancún, Mexico, just prior to the ICANN67 Public Meeting, by 15 November.

# ALAC/At-Large Update

The <u>ALAC monthly call</u> was held on 22 October. There was a review of ATLAS III and ICANN66 issues as main items on the call.

There was a discussion on At-Large Policy activity, including recently ratified statements policy issues under discussion and an updates on the Seat 15 Election Cycle 2019-2020.

There was also a review of At-Large membership applications, RALO and Liaision reports and discussion with At-Large Plus Leaders, and finally an update on ATLAS III and the ICANN66 schedule.

#### **Updates from ISOC Armenia**

October was a busy IT month in Armenia. On 6-9 October the country hosted WCIT2019 (World Congress of Information Technologies). On 10-12 October ISOC Armenia together with other local and international partners organized the N2 Forum (Numbers and Names), a series of events among which were the 5th edition of the Armenian IGF, the 1st Youth IGF Armenia and the 4th EE DNS Forum. We had a pleasure and honor to welcome Göran Marby, ICANN CEO and President, David Conrad, ICANN CTO as well as Danko Jevtovich, ICANN Board member joining the meetings.



Mr. Marby delivered a keynote speech at the Grand Opening of the Forum followed by the Minister of High-Tech Industry of Armenia. Among other speakers at the Opening Ceremony was Lianna Galstyan, APRALO Vice Chair. She spoke in her role of IGF MAG member and a Coordinator of the Armenian IGF.



Each day of the Forum around 200 participants from all stakeholder groups coming from many countries of the region, joined the discussions and shared their knowledge and experience. High-interest topics of discussions were Data Localisation, Cybersecurity, Local Content, Emerging Technologies in Digital Economy, ICANN Policy and Technical updates, IDNs and Universal Acceptance, etc. Details of these events are available at corresponding websites.

On 10 October 2019, the Armenian ccTLD Registry celebrated the 25th anniversary of ".am", inviting participants of the Forum and other honorary guests from the industry. This was a notable milestone for the country and the ccTLD Registry.
