Public Comment is a vital element in ICANN's decision-making process whereby everyone is given an opportunity to comment on topic-specific reports, proposals, recommendations, and PDP related deliverables initiated by the ICANN Community and Staff Departments. Each Public Comment provides links to relevant announcement, key document, reference sources, and the comment forum. To see an example, check out ICANN's Public Comment landing page: www.icann.org/public-comments.

Each Public Comment solicitation is open for at least 40 days. During this period, any individual or organization, both internal and external to ICANN, can submit comments. After the comment period closes, ICANN Staff produces the Staff Summary Report that compiles and synthesizes the comments received for the originators to evaluate and incorporate in the final product.

The ALAC has been actively participating in the Public Comment proceedings by submitting [ALAC Policy Advice Statements](#) in response to given topics.

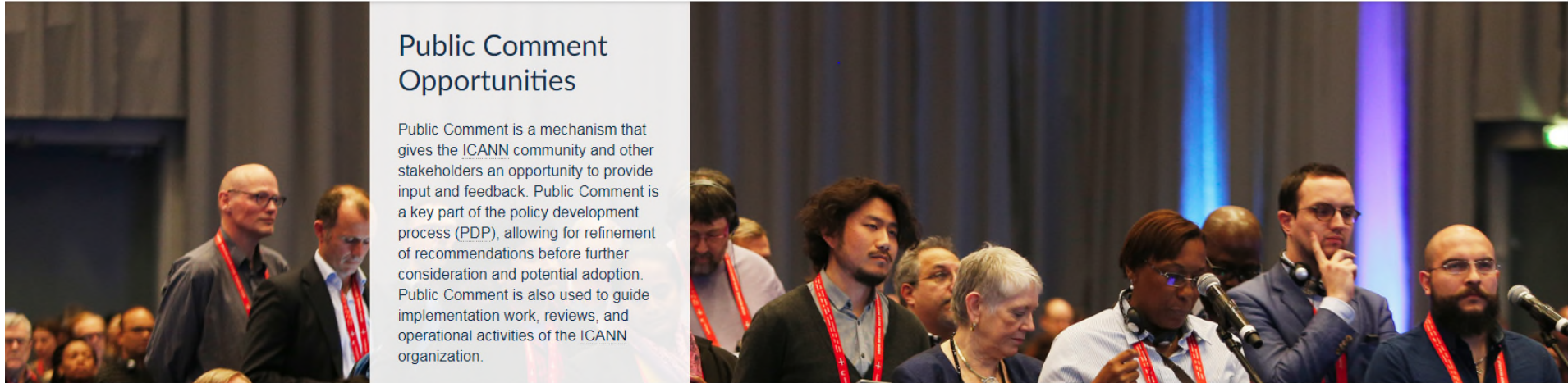

At-Large Advisory Committee (ALAC)

ALAC voices interests of Internet end users and advises ICANN Board on policies within ICANN's mission and scope.

ALAC Advice Development Process

- IDENTIFY THE ISSUE**
 - Any community member can bring up emerging issues to ALAC.
- SCOPE THE ISSUE**
 - ALAC discusses its relevance to end users and decides if it needs to respond.
 - ALAC determines if issue is in scope.
- DEVELOP ADVICE**
 - ALAC appoints At-Large community member to lead small team to write draft statement and begin consultation.
 - Anyone may contribute to draft statement.
- RATIFY ADVICE**
 - ALAC reviews and calls for consensus or votes on final statement.
 - If ratified, ALAC sends advice to ICANN Board, ICANN org, SOs/ACs, or other ICANN community members for consideration.

Governmental Advisory Committee (GAC)

GAC advises ICANN Board on public policy issues, particularly in areas where ICANN policies intersect with national laws and international agreements.

GAC Advice Development Process

- IDENTIFY THE ISSUE**
 - Any GAC member or observer may raise issues for discussion.
 - ICANN Board may also seek GAC advice.
- COLLECT MEMBER VIEWS**
 - GAC chair solicits input from GAC members, observers, or working groups.
- ACHIEVE CONSENSUS**
 - GAC chair summarizes comments with aim of reaching GAC consensus.
- DRAFT ADVICE**
 - GAC members, observers, or working groups contribute to draft advice.
 - GAC reviews advice.
- ISSUE ADVICE**
 - If consensus is reached, GAC chair issues communiqué or other formal written statement to ICANN Board.

Root Server System Advisory Committee (RSSAC)

RSSAC advises ICANN Board and community on matters relating to the operation, administration, security, and integrity of the Internet's Root Server System.

RSSAC Advice Development Process

- IDENTIFY THE ISSUE**
 - Any RSSAC or RSSAC Caucus member may propose work item, including requests from ICANN Board, then submits statement of work for RSSAC to consider.
- SCOPE THE ISSUE**
 - RSSAC reviews statement of work.
 - If approved, RSSAC creates a work party of either RSSAC or RSSAC Caucus members.
- DEVELOP ADVICE**
 - Work party writes draft document, which its leader sends for review until no further comments are received.
 - If RSSAC Caucus has not been involved, RSSAC work party leader may send draft document for its review.
- RATIFY ADVICE**
 - Work party submits draft document to RSSAC.
 - RSSAC votes on draft document.
- PREVIEW RECOMMENDATIONS**
 - RSSAC may share content with those it might affect.
 - RSSAC may also post approved document for Public Comment.
- PUBLISH ADVICE**
 - RSSAC publishes approved document.
 - RSSAC tracks and reviews effects of its recommendations.

Security and Stability Advisory Committee (SSAC)

SSAC advises ICANN Board and community on issues relating to the security and integrity of the Internet's naming and address allocation systems.

SSAC Advice Development Process

- IDENTIFY THE ISSUE**
 - SSAC members, ICANN Board, SOs/ACs, or ICANN org may request SSAC to review issue.
- STUDY THE ISSUE**
 - If SSAC agrees to review issue, work party begins draft document.
- PRELIMINARY REVIEW**
 - Work party may share draft document with those it might affect.
 - Work party sends revisions to SSAC.
 - SSAC may post draft document for Public Comment.
- PREVIEW RECOMMENDATIONS**
 - SSAC reaches consensus on final document.
 - SSAC chair may share final document with relevant parties in ICANN community or ICANN legal.
- PUBLISH ADVICE**
 - SSAC publishes approved document.
 - SSAC tracks and reviews effects of its recommendations.

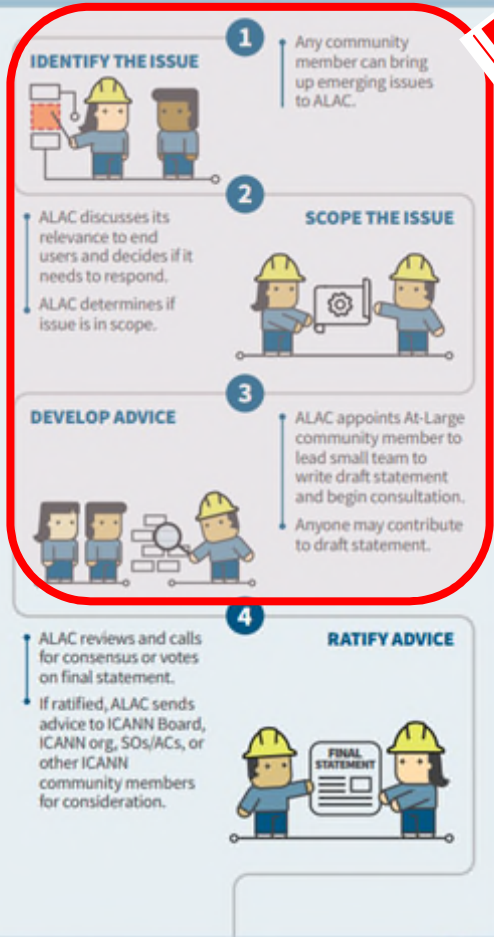

Description

The Consolidated Policy Working Group (CPWG) was formed in December 2017, as a union of three At-Large Working Groups: At-Large Registration Issues Working Group, At-Large New gTLDs Working Group and At-Large ICANN Evolution Working Group.

The WG is Co-chaired by Jonathan Zuck and Olivier Crépin-Leblond. **New people are welcome to join any of the component groups and they will then become a member of the CPWG automatically. But they cannot join the CPWG itself directly.** The focus of the Consolidated Policy Working Group (CPWG) is directed towards policy comments and advice within At-Large, best practices for identifying Internet end user issues in the policy development process at ICANN, and engaging the At-Large community further on policy comments and advice.

Necessity for ALAC Policy Advice

- **Does a topic or areas impact the interests of the Internet End-User*?**

- If yes:

- ❖ How are those interests impacted, either positively or negatively?
- ❖ What policy inputs can we offer that will strengthen the positive impact and/or prevent or lessen the negative impact?
- ❖ Does the gravity of the impact require us to advocate our position beyond merely submitting a statement via the Public Comment process?

- If no, then we decline to submit a statement.

* Internet End-Users includes the casual registrant



- **Who volunteers as Penholder(s)?**

- Works best if penholder(s) are At-Large Community member(s) who:

**“Read,
read,
read”**

- ❖ Have relevant knowledge/expertise/experience
- ❖ Are active members of relevant Working Group
- ❖ Read associated input materials, supporting documents, relevant past statements, etc
- ❖ **Understand the issues as they relate to End-Users**
- ❖ Are strong communicators
- ❖ Often but not always drawn from amongst ALAC Members, ALAC Appointees or At-Large leaders
- ❖ Can act singularly and/or in small team

- Why? Because of what penholders are expected to do, which in turn is dependent on workload.



- **What do Penholders do?**

- Prior to drafting any statement:

- **“Identify”** ❖ **Identify the issues as they relate to End-Users**

- **“Scope”** ❖ Preferably, present background to identified issues as contained in input materials etc

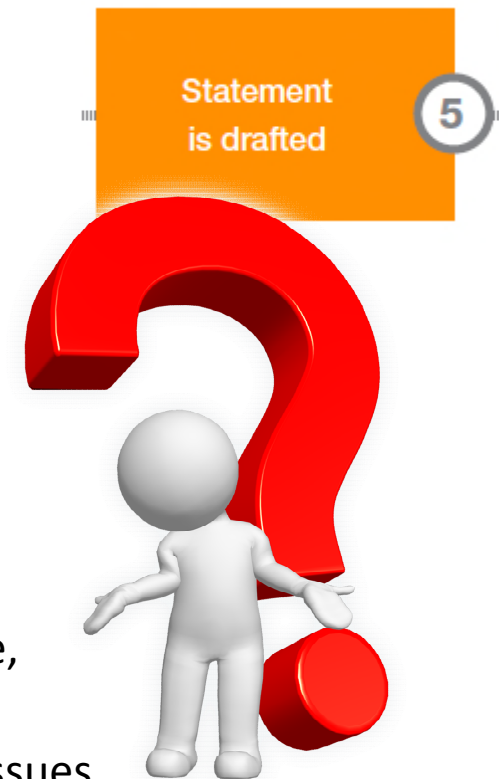
- ❖ Where possible, present arguments/points raised /identified by other parts of the ICANN Community on those issues at relevant fora

- ❖ Solicit inputs from At-Large members – wiki workspace, mailing list, weekly calls, Googledocs etc

- **“Develop”** ❖ From inputs received, develop proposed positions to issues

- ❖ Present proposed positions and re-solicit further inputs or where possible, **establish consensus**

- (Ideally) then only start to draft a statement



- **What else do Penholders do?**

- Once draft statement is published:
 - ❖ Call for comments - solicit further inputs or where feasible, attempt to again **establish consensus** for positions which did not enjoy consensus before
 - ❖ At-Large members to respond
 - ❖ Incorporation of further inputs, where feasible or relevant
 - ❖ As many rounds as needed within time limits / Public Comment deadline
- And finalize statement which then goes to ALAC for ratification prior to submission
 - ❖ In some cases, finalized statement is submitted first then re-submitted with ALAC ratification endorsement

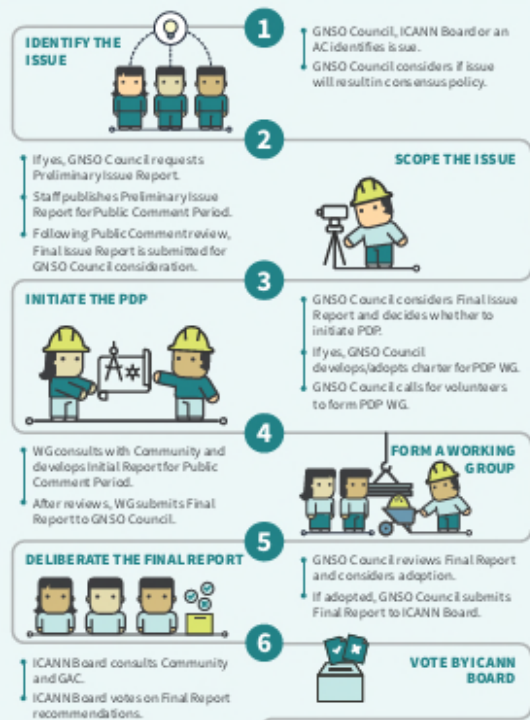

New Generic Top Level Domain Subsequent Procedures

- **For next round of New gTLD applications (if any)**
 - *Distinct from 2012 round*
- **New gTLD Subsequent Procedures PDP WG**
 - *Policy Development Process (PDP) purview of GNSO Council*
 - *PDP initiated in Dec 2015, chartered in Jan 2016*
 - *WG started work in Feb 2016, considering changes as necessary to existing policy recommendations and implementation guidance*
 - *WG tackled > 40 separate topics via Plenary, Work Tracks 1-4, Work Track 5 on Geographic Names at the Top Level*
 - *Between Nov 2018 – Mar 2019, undertook high level checks, clarification of public comments received*
 - ***Now reviewing merits of public comments for reporting***
 - ***WG work expected to go on until Q4 2019 – Final Report***

The Working Group has produced its Initial Report, which includes material from the full Working Group and Work Tracks 1-4. Work Track 5, focused on Geographic Names at the Top-Level, was established later than the other Work Tracks and will produce a separate Initial Report.

The objective of this Initial Report is to document the Working Group's deliberations on charter issues and preliminary recommendations, potential options for recommendations, as well as specific questions for which the Working Group is seeking input. Given the large number of issues, and the thousands of hours spent on addressing the 2012 New gTLD Program and improvements that can be made to the program moving forward, unlike other Initial Reports, this one does not contain a "Statement of level of consensus for the recommendations presented in the Initial Report." The Co-Chairs not only believed that it was premature to measure the level of consensus of the Working Group members of dozens of recommendations contained within the Initial Report, but that doing so could have the unintended consequence of locking Working Group members into positions of support or opposition prior to soliciting public comment from the community on those recommendations. To form such definitive positions at this early of a stage could have the adverse effect of being less open to modifications to those positions as a result of community input.

In addition, though many of the preliminary recommendations were generally agreed to by members that participated in the different Work Tracks, support has not been assessed amongst the members of the overall Working Group. The Overall Working Group has not sought to form definitive positions on each of these issues at this stage. Therefore, any language in this report that suggests that the Working Group or any of its Work Tracks is making a recommendation should be read as merely a rough assessment by the Working Group co-chairs or Work Track leads.

After a comprehensive review of public comments received on this report, the Working Group will deliberate further on the preliminary recommendations contained within the Initial Report. It is possible that as a result of the deliberations, there may be supplemental reports released by the Working Group seeking additional public comments. Once all of that is completed, the Co-Chairs will conduct any formal consensus call(s) at the plenary level, on all recommendations before the Working Group issues its Final Report.

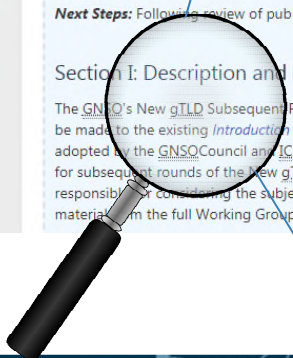

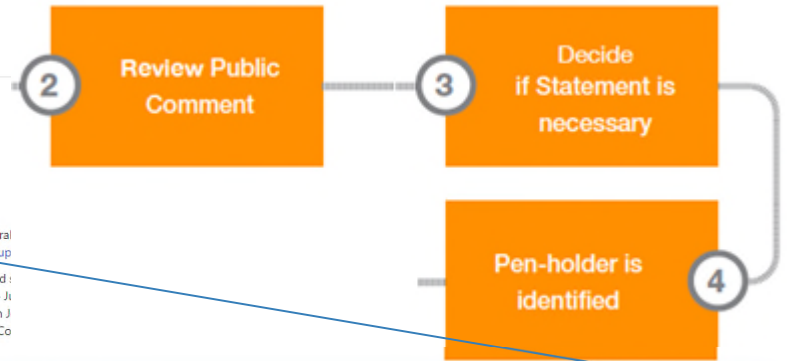

Metrics

The ALAC believes that metrics should be developed and used both to gauge the extent to which Internet end-users have benefitted from the introduction and use of new gTLDs and to highlight areas in which improvements to the introduction can be improved for the benefit of end-users.

Public Interest Commitments

Public Interest Commitments (PICs) are a core part of the ALAC's campaign for TLDs that have a high public interest worth. Therefore, the ALAC supports the prospects of ICANN codifying mandatory PICs. The ALAC also notes the usefulness of Voluntary PICs from the 2012 rounds in respect of applications for strings representing highly regulated sectors and on this basis supports the continued use of Voluntary PICs in the effort to protect the interest of Internet end-users.

Applicant Support Program

The ALAC strongly advocates for Applicant Support to continue to be open to applicants whose applications are conceived to serve underserved regions and/or underserved communities regardless of their location so long as they meet the other Applicant Support Program (ASP) criteria. Further, we believe that it is imperative that ICANN improve the global awareness of the ASP through effective means. The ALAC also advocates for all Applicant Support applicants who are found to have failed the criteria for the ASP to be allowed to decide if they wish to pursue or withdraw their application, with the grant of sufficient time to pay the balance of the full application fee amount, unless the Support Application Review Panel (SARP) determines that an application has been the subject of wilful gaming. Terminating all applications determined as not meeting the criteria as was the case in the 2012 round is a disproportionate means of preventing gaming of the ASP.

IDNs

The ALAC is strongly in favour of IDNs being continued as an integral part of the Program since – putting aside telecommunications infrastructure availability (which is beyond the remit of ICANN) – IDNs have the potential to benefit countless communities whose languages are not Roman-script based. While the ALAC agrees with many of the preliminary recommendations set out in the Initial Report, it also advocates for Pre-Delegation Testing to continue to be conducted for TLD applications as a prudent safeguard measure, regardless of the presence of a general agreement on compliance with IDNA2008 (or its successor(s)) and applicable LGRs. The ALAC also believes that IDN variant-related policies such as "bundling" are best handled at the TLD-level provided that if both variants are registered, they need to be under the control of the same registrant.

Implementation Guideline F: If there is contention for strings, applicants may:

- i) resolve contention between them within a pre-established timeframe
- ii) if there is no mutual agreement, a claim to support a community by one party will be a reason to award priority to that application. If there is no such claim, and no mutual agreement a process will be put in place to enable efficient resolution of contention, and;
- iii) the ICANN Board may be used to make a final decision, using advice from staff and expert panels.

- ❑ Implementation Guideline F spoke to alternatives to auctions of last resort, not reference auctions specifically.

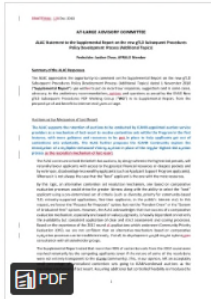

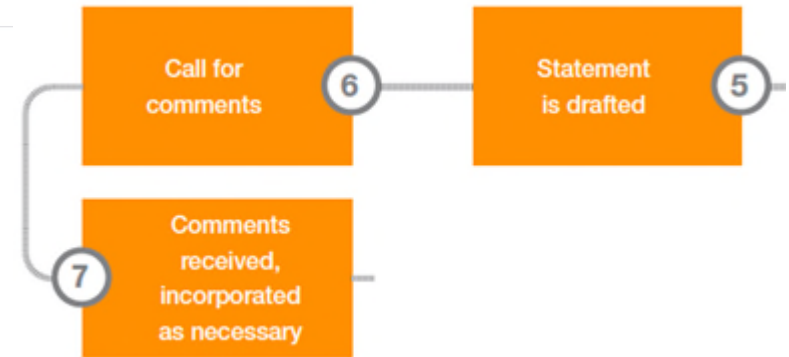

Summary of the ALAC Responses

The ALAC appreciates the opportunity to comment on the Supplemental Report on the new gTLD Subsequent Procedures Policy Development Process (Additional Topics) dated 1 November 2018 ("Supplemental Report"). We wish to put on record our responses, suggestions and in some cases, advocacy, to the preliminary recommendations, options and questions as posed by the GNSO New gTLD Subsequent Procedures PDP Working Group ("WG") in its Supplemental Report, from the perspective of and benefit to Internet end-users at large.

Auctions as the Mechanism of Last Resort

The ALAC strongly opposes the retention of the regular highest-bid auction process which was used in the 2012 round ("regular auctions") as the mechanism of last resort for resolution of contention sets within the Program. Instead, we propose that the ICANN Community explore the introduction of a multiplier-enhanced Vickrey auction (as described in our response to Option 2.1.d.1) in place of regular auctions while strongly advocating for more guidance and resources to be put in place to help applicants get out of contention sets voluntarily, thereby avoiding going through to auctions to resolve their contention sets. Further, all such modified Vickrey auctions should be conducted by ICANN-appointed auction service providers.

The ALAC supports the retention of auctions to be conducted by ICANN-appointed auction service providers as a mechanism of last resort to resolve contention sets within the Program in the first instance, with more guidance and resources to be put in place to help applicants get out of contentions sets voluntarily. The ALAC further proposes the ICANN Community explore the introduction of a multiplier-enhanced Vickrey auction in place of the regular highest-bid auction process as the resolution mechanism of last resort.

The ALAC continues to hold the belief that auctions, by design wherein the highest bid prevails, will naturally favour applicants with access to the greatest financial resources or deepest pockets and by extension, disadvantage less wealthy applicants (such as Applicant Support Program applicants). Whereas it is not always the case that the "best" applicant is the one with the most resources. For this reason, we strongly oppose the continued use of regular auctions as the mechanism of last resort for resolution of contention sets.

By this logic, an alternative contention set resolution mechanism, one based on comparative evaluation processes would strive for greater fairness along with the ability to select the "best"

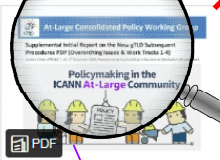

PROPOSED AMENDED DRAFT STATEMENT as at 17 Dec based on earlier consensus

- ❑ **The ALAC proposes that the ICANN Community explore the introduction of a multiplier-enhanced Vickrey auction (as described in our response to Option 2.1.d.1) in place of the regular highest-bid auction process as the resolution mechanism of last resort but also advocates for more guidance and resources to be put in place to help applicants get out of contentions sets voluntarily in order to avoid going through to auctions to resolve their contention sets. Further, in the event the Vickrey auction mechanism is to proceed, then all such auctions should be conducted by ICANN-appointed auction service providers.**
 - ✓ Retain belief that auctions, by design wherein the highest bid prevails, will naturally favour applicants with deepest pockets -- not always the case that the "best" applicant is the one with the most resources
 - ✓ **Considered alternative contention set resolution mechanism**, one based on comparative evaluation processes would strive for greater fairness along with the ability to select the "best" applicant using a pre-determined set of criteria
 - ❖ Thus, **favour the "Request for Proposals" option**, but not the "Random Draw" or the "System of Graduated Fees" options.
 - ❖ But the ALAC acknowledges that **true success of a comparative evaluation mechanism**, especially one based on value judgments, **is heavily dependent on not only the availability but consistent application of clear and strict assessment and scoring processes**. Based on the experience of the 2012 round of applications which underwent Community Priority Evaluation (CPE), we are **not confident that an alternative mechanism based on comparative evaluation processes can be established easily. If at all, its development would require extensive consultation with all stakeholder groups.**
 - ✓ Given <10% contention sets from 2012 round went to auction + with expansion of permissible Change Requests (controlled flexibility) → possibility that incidences of contention sets could be more desirably resolved other than by way of auctions.
 - ✓ Supportive of the option to **introduce the Vickrey auction in place of the "regular" auction**. Although the Vickrey auction still relies on the notion of a winning highest bid, the ALAC opines that its nature of accepting placement of secret-bids will do a lot to prevent in future rounds the repeat of some of the speculative applications which were seen in the 2012 round.
 - ❖ Temper weakness of auction by adding a **multiplier feature** in Vickrey auction in favour of certain applicants – ASP, CPE – where secret bid automatically upgraded by a fixed capped multiplier.

Instead, we propose that the ICANN Community explore the introduction of a multiplier-enhanced Vickrey auction (as described in our response to Option 2.1.d.1) in place of regular auctions while strongly advocating for more guidance and resources to be put in place to help applicants get out of contention sets voluntarily, thereby avoiding going through to auctions to resolve their contention sets. Further, all such modified Vickrey auctions should be conducted by ICANN-appointed auction service providers.

The ALAC supports the retention of auctions to be conducted by ICANN-appointed auction service providers as a mechanism of last resort to resolve contention sets within the Program in the first instance, with more guidance and resources to be put in place to help applicants get out of contention sets voluntarily. The ALAC further proposes the ICANN Community explore the introduction of a multiplier-enhanced Vickrey auction in place of the regular highest-bid auction process as the resolution mechanism of last resort.

The ALAC continues to hold the belief that auctions, by design wherein the highest bid prevails, will naturally favour applicants with access to the greatest financial resources or deepest pockets and by extension, disadvantage less wealthy applicants (such as Applicant Support Program applicants). Whereas it is not always the case that the "best" applicant is the one with the most resources. For this reason, we strongly oppose the continued use of regular auctions as the mechanism of last resort for resolution of contention sets.

By this logic, an alternative contention set resolution mechanism, one based on comparative evaluation processes would strive for greater fairness along with the ability to select the "best"

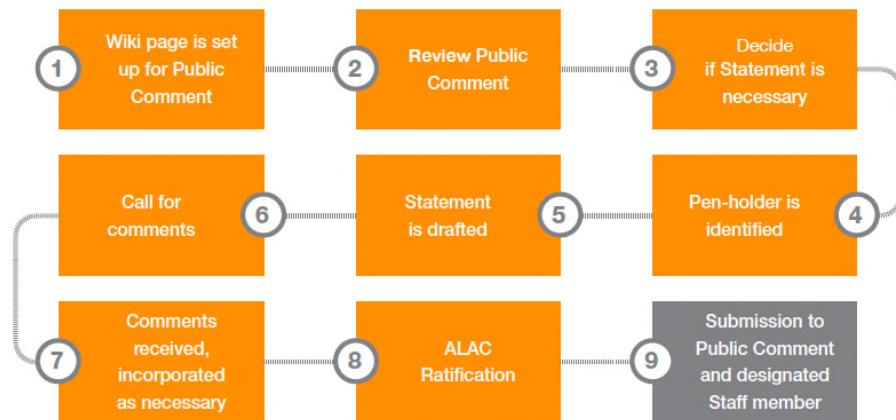
