## 1. Current employer and position. Please describe the type of work you perform:

The Gambia YMCAs Computer Training Centre, I have served as the Coordinator / CEO since 2<sup>nd</sup> Feb 1996 when I set up the Centre which is a Non governmental Organization registered in the Gambia. Our focus which manages focuses mainly on ICT Capacity building programs, coding, Hub space, Internet Technologies, Project Management, Digital Media, Internet Governance and use of ICT4D.

In my role I manage a staff of approximately 25 persons, lead curriculum development, project management, Training, Budgeting, mentoring of new staff, and in sit on the Board of the centre. I also oversee our International partnership, Strategic planning committee to name a few.

### 2. Education:

Poncelet O. Ileleji is a computer Scientist by Profession with 23 years in the field; he has been involved with the use of ICT as a tool for sustainable development both as a lecturer, researcher and consultant for the Gambia YMCAs, where he is the coordinator of the computer training centre and digital studio. He has also served as consultant for several projects in Africa covering ICT for D, Learning, Technologies and Education, Internet Governance and Health Informatics. He served also as an International Coordinator for the International YMCA of New York, International Camp Counselor Program. Poncelet served as the country coordinator for the World Links program in the Gambia during the program life cycle in The Gambia from 2001 to 2005, The program was funded and initiated by the World Bank and it adopted a constructivist approach to teaching with ICT that emphasized a shift away from teacher centered lecturebased instruction towards student-centered, project-based learning during the program life cycle from 2001 to 2005 in the Gambia. As the national focal resource person for the West African Internet Governance Form Gambia chapter (<a href="www.waigf.org">www.waigf.org</a>) I fully take part in supporting young professionals trying to understand the IG space and ICANN during ICANN sessions at our various regional IGFs in my region of West Africa.

As a leader of my organization my written and verbal communication is very strong with a positive note to it in working especially with young professionals who I guide in their careers in the various aspects of ICT we work in. I have also engaged in regular programs on Internet technologies in my country online and on various TV and FM radio stations. Within my NPOC constituency I am one of the most active voices in communicating my thoughts within our NCSG and NPOC mailing list

As a leader of my organization I lead several projects that require project management and coordination skills. I have lead projects that range from World Bank funded projects on ICT and Education, to those that deal with Digital security as one I recently managed early this year funded by HIVOS. Yearly I currently have 5 to 8 projects in my organization I directly project manage or supervise staff that do. I manage a core team of 15 staff, 5 at senior management level that report directly to me and are part of my core management team.

Am a networker, my community outreach and networking skills make it possible for me to collaborate with various kind of partners and communities especially within my passion of ICTs especially the Internet as an enabler in changing lives. I belong to various initiatives like the Internet Freedom Festival that take place in Valencia yearly, as a member of the Association for Progressive Communication which is a well networked organization in what we they do in regards to the Internet, its gives me a good array of professionals to seek advise from that we in the same

organizational membership. Am a diplo foundation alumni all these network contribute to what I do in supporting mentees these are networks that are very relevant to what I do within the ICANN community of which I am part of the NPOC constituency.

will be something I will focus my agenda on working with the mentees on a one to one basis when developing such schedule in doing that you make the mentees also claim ownership of their learning process with me the mentor as a guide.
