For the last 15 years I have run AMGlobal Consulting, an SME consulting firm working in the tech and technology policy space – specializing in work with Internet Governance, technology in emerging markets, and facilitating public private partnerships. Our firm has worked with NGOs, companies and donors with clients from North and South America, Africa, Asia and Europe.

I've spoken to gatherings of Fellows in meetings past and have worked with the Mentoring program to help coordinate on our BC Outreach, but my entry into ICANN world predates the Fellowship program so I wasn't a Mentee.

I've been a long-time member of the BC, having been a representative of the BC on different committees and a BC officer. I've served for a number of years as Chair of the BC Outreach Committee and as Chair of the Credentials Committee, as well as serving a term as Chair of the Business Constituency. I've also done work on a project for the CCTRT.

Our firm is well known internationally for facilitation and partnership building, working with the World Bank, AbInbev, Toyota, USAID, major NGOs and others to build durable, multi-party and cross-cultural partnerships. I've been a lecturer at Washington, DC universities on issues from tech policy to communications, the future of work and Africa, and with programs from the US Institute of Peace, the Department of State and Department of Commerce providing mentoring to foreign delegations.

I work in English, Spanish, French and Portuguese. I have appeared on TV/radio not just in my home country but in a number of countries – including many in emerging nations where Fellows come from – speaking about technology issues, including at Africa DNS, Africa IGF, Dominios Latinoamericano, RioInfo and other events.

I was a project manager for the World Bank and have managed projects for ICANN and the BC, as well as for PIR, .club, AT&T and other well known players in the ICANN space.

And I am a well-known networker within the ICANN space, a part of ICANN Francophonie, a regular participant in LAC Space and a strong supporter of DNS Women programs.

- I am well known within ICANN, with strong contacts in the CC, ALAC, NCUC/NPOC and other communities; I'm even part of GEMS! Definitely known as an accessible person who can help make things simple – since this is often part of our partnerships and press work
- I manage numerous projects and am comfortable with this process

7. Please explain your interest in serving as a mentor and what you will bring to the Fellowship Program if selected.

I have always been committed to making ICANN relevant, open and accessible to audiences around the world. I served 3 years as Chair of the BC's Outreach Committee, during which we dramatically expanded representation in the developing world and achieved nearly 100% gender balance in our constituency, and I'm now looking for a new way to serve the community and make it more open to new audiences.

I know from my work just how hard it is to explain ICANN, its workings, and the multi-stakeholder model – but also how important it is to bring in new ideas and new voices. I know because I did not start with a pure tech background how important it is to keep things simple and relate them to the issues and concerns of Fellows wherever they come from. And as someone who has worked in nearly 80 countries, I know how to tailor my message to the audience.

With my language background, my experience and the fact that I'm a bridge-builder, I think I can work with anyone in the Fellows program to help them come up to speed and make them feel welcome.
