3. You need to fill in all sections of the form. If a given criteria (e.g. expertise) does not apply to you, leave the field empty.
4. Once you have completed the form, save it on your computer/tablet/smartphone.
5. Create a new email message addressed to gns0-secs@icann.org, attach the form which you previously saved and submit the application.

1. Current employer and position. Please describe the type of work you perform:

I direct a small Internet Governance and Policies consultancy, Governance Primer, in which I perform international contract work. My two main areas of focus are linguistic diversity and access to health online.

In the Universal Acceptance Steering Group (UASG) I served as Ambassador for 2 years, performing outreach to varied stakeholders, organizing events, and producing communication materials. I subsequently became a contractor for the group's technical projects.

I am also serving my second term as a Board member of the Prescription Justice Institute, an organization that studies and advocates in favor of the access to safe and cost-effective medicines regardless of jurisdiction.

I am finishing my second term in the GNSO Council representing the BC and will step down during the next AGM, freeing up time to dedicate myself to other voluntary activities, of which I would strongly prefer this one.

In the start of my ICANN journey, I was awarded the Fellowship 3 times, and subsequently became what was then known as a Fellow Coach (which now gave way to Mentors).

I have been active in the ICANN community since 2015, being involved in a variety of activities and groups, most recently those related to DNS Abuse. I have been responsible for dozens of the BC's Public Comments, as well as representing the Constituency in intercommunity interactions, particularly with the ALAC. During the Cancún meeting, I successfully concluded the ICANN Leadership program managed by Sandra Hoferichter.

I have contributed to advancing Univesal Acceptance within ICANN by serving as a bridge between the GNSO and the UASG, being responsible for intermediating communications between both groups and ensuring their alignment.

I am the project manager at the Governance Primer consultancy, and have successfully delivered over 20 complete projects to date.

One of my main voluntary tasks outside of ICANN is the teaching of Internet Governance at no cost for students at the late high school and university level, using didactics that are fun

and easy to understand, but fully retain veracity. As recently as last year¹ this course has been carried out in Brazil, and plans are underway to repeat it soon.

Ever since I have been outside of formal mentoring positions with the NextGen and Fellowship programs, I have maintained an informal support network for entrants. I always attend the initial NextGen meeting and talk to them individually to help them find their path within ICANN. I also look into the Fellowship selectees list every meeting and reach out to the people coming from the private sector to assist them in whatever matter they might need.

I believe I have built over the year a strong relationship with stakeholders from all parts of ICANN, and know at least by name most of the active community members. It is always a personal pleasure to me to be able to put into contact entrants and community veterans, especially when there is clear potential for collaboration.

7. Please explain your interest in serving as a mentor and what you will bring to the Fellowship Program if selected.

I have already been informally doing an effort for years to help entrants in ICANN, and to formalize this role would be of great help, so that I could benefit more from being in contact with them earlier and actually helping them build their participation plans from the ground up.

I owe a lot of my success to the Fellowship program, and I intend to continue giving back to it for as long as I can.
