

Evan Leibovitch is Vice-Chair of the At-Large Advisory Committee (ALAC) and a representative of the North American region. Previously he was the first Chair of ICANN's North American Regional At-Large Organization (NARALO), a position he served for three years before being elected to the ALAC to a two-year term ending fall of 2012.

Evan's background is in publishing and communications using Internet and print media. A professional journalist by training, he currently works at York University as Open Source Architect and has his own consulting company. His current projects are

- Developing advanced systems for e-book reading on mobile devices
- Creation and architecture development of social media strategies and systems to assist academic researchers studying refugee and migration issues globally, using various tools including the Drupal Content Management System

Previously, he has been active in the open source community, and was co-founder of the Linux Professional Institute and the Canadian Association for Open Source. He led a 22-person multinational delegation to the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) in Geneva to promote the use of open source and free software. He has written extensively for IT publications and blogs on open source and e-books, and both spoken and given keynote addresses at conferences on open source, open standards, and education issues. He has created and served on the boards of multiple non-profit organizations and has received a human rights award for his help in creating an Internet archive on the Holocaust.

Evan has no financial interest in any ICANN related activity, beyond owning and managing a few domains for himself and some friends.
