To Summarize

2025 will mark the 20th anniversary of the World Summit of the Information Society (WSIS). The WSIS process was pivotal in gaining U.N. Member States' endorsement to the multistakeholder model of Internet governance. The multistakeholder model is critical for the continued development of a secure and interoperable Internet. Continuation of WSIS will be determined by the U.N. General Assembly (UNGA) in 2025.



Why Does WSIS Matter?

- For the Multistakeholder model (MSM)
 - UN Member States recognized the MSM of Internet Governance.
 - UN Member States agreed that the technical community is a separate stakeholder with its own unique role: to keep the Internet running.
- Recognized that the international management should (among others)
 "ensure a stable and secure functioning of the Internet, taking into account multilingualism". (WSIS Tunis Agenda, 2005)
- Established the Internet Governance Forum (IGF) the only multistakeholder platform for Internet-related discussions under the UN umbrella
- Recognized that "the management of the Internet as a global facility includes multilateral, transparent, democratic and multi-stakeholder processes, with the full involvement of Governments, the private sector, civil society, international organizations, technical and academic communities and all other relevant stakeholders in accordance with their respective roles and responsibilities." (WSIS+10 UNGA Resolution, 2015)
