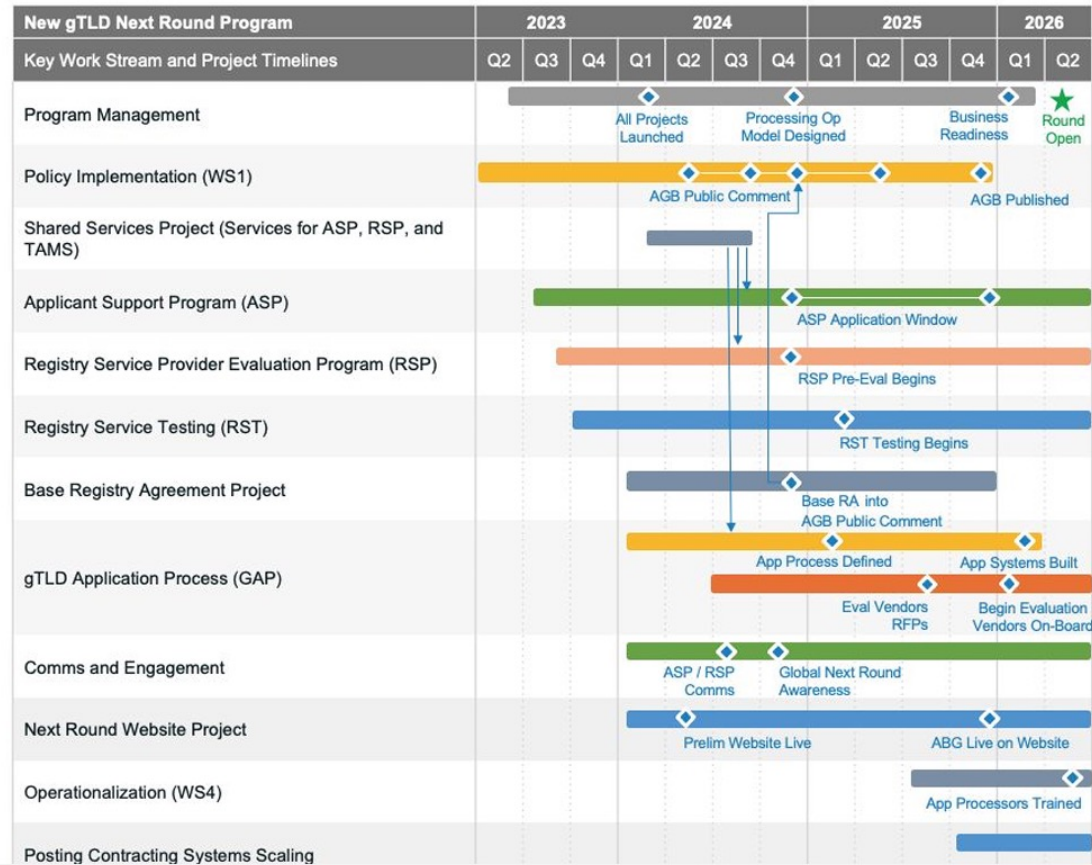

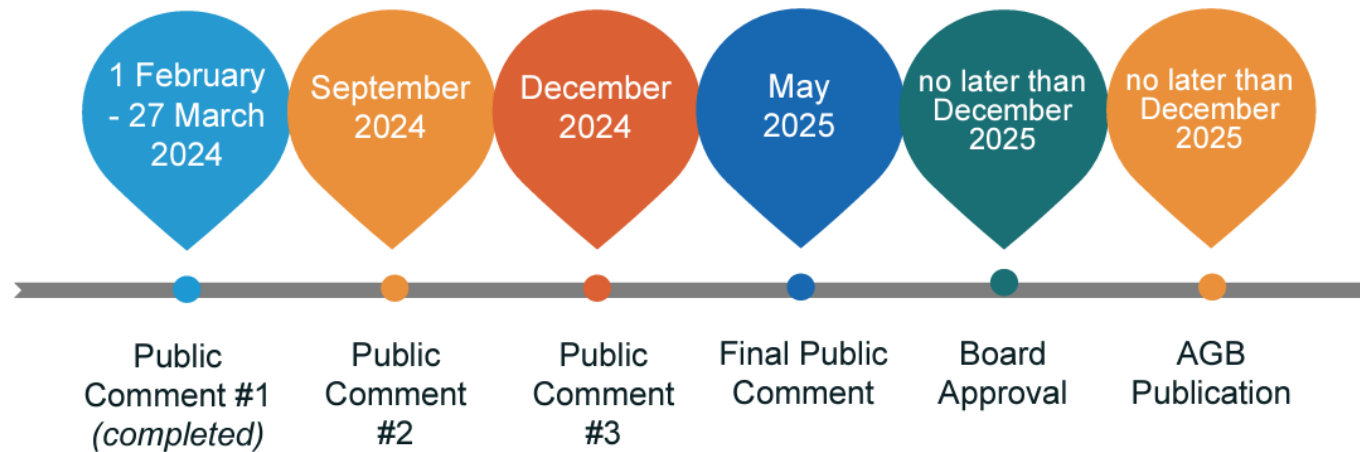
High-Level Program Timeline by Project – April 2024

The New gTLD Program

The New Generic Top-Level Domain (gTLD) Program: Next Round is an ICANN initiative to enable the expansion of the Internet's Domain Name System (DNS) through the introduction of new top-level domains.

 <h4>Applicant Support Program (ASP)</h4> <p>The Applicant Support Program (ASP) is an initiative intended to provide financial and non-financial support for eligible entities that demonstrate financial need.</p>	 <h4>Registry Service Provider (RSP)</h4> <p>The Registry Service Provider (RSP) Evaluation Program will evaluate RSPs before the gTLD application window opening, thereby reducing duplicative work and testing.</p>	 <h4>Applicant Guidebook (AGB)</h4> <p>The AGB for the next round is being developed in collaboration with the Implementation Review Team. The AGB is expected to be completed by May 2025.</p>

Applicant Support Program

- On Schedule to launch Application Submission Period in Q4 2024
- ASP Implementation Team still having discussions
- Applicants that qualify for support will be eligible for financial and non-financial assistance to apply for a gTLD including:
 - Reduced gTLD base application and other gTLD evaluation fees (between 75%-85% reduction).
 - Access to volunteer professional services, training, and other resources.

- **Important Note:** Qualifying for support via the ASP does not equate to qualifying for a gTLD. Qualified supported applicants must also apply for a gTLD in Q2 2026 and be evaluated according to the criteria in the gTLD Program: Next Round Applicant Guidebook.

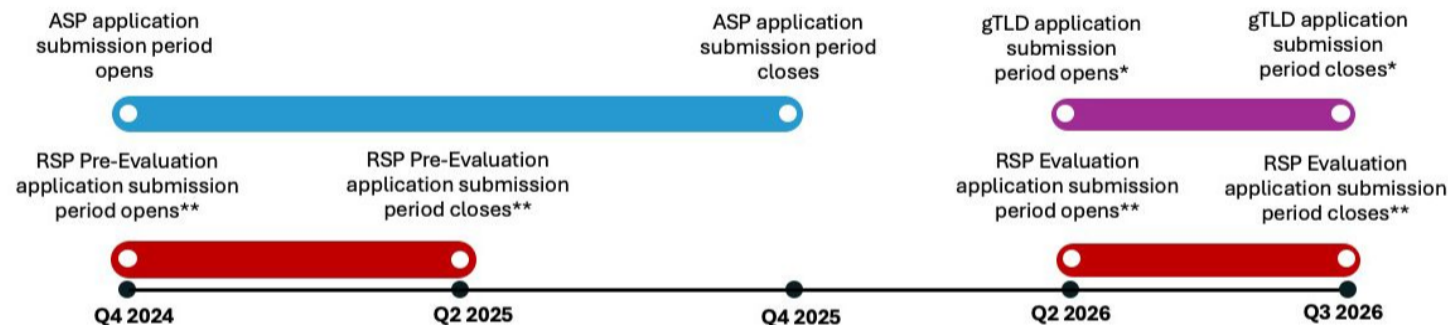

RSP Program Timeline

* The New gTLD application submission period is projected to open in April 2026 for 12-15 weeks.

** The two RSP Evaluation application submission periods are projected to open **19 November 2024** and close **20 May 2025 (pre-evaluation)** and then open again **April 2026 for 12-15 weeks**.

Dates may be subject to change

ICANN org plans to publish public portions and results of the RSP applications for the first time on 9 December 2025.



ICANN 80 Sessions



SubPro IRT Sessions

1. Session 1: Focused on Application Fees and Predictability Framework.
 1. [ICANN Presentation](#): Range between \$208,000 – 293,000 depending on total number of Applications Received. If more than 1,000 applications received, there will be a refund/credit of excess funds – TBD.
 2. Most increases tied to inflation and the cost of living increases
 3. This does not include the RSP fee which is estimate at between \$60,000 and \$92,000 per RSP (depending on number of participants).
2. Session 2: Focused on ASP Bid Credits for Auctions of Last Resort.
 1. Discussion focused on research of Bid Credits vs. set-asides

3. Session 3: Continued discussion of Fees and credit vs. refund as well as a discussion about Predictability Mechanism and the “SPIRT” in addressing changes.



ICANN Board Resolution on RVCs

Resolved (2024.06.08.08), the ICANN Board determines that ICANN should exclude from the Next Round RAs any RVCs and other comparable registry commitments that restrict content in gTLDs.

- Lots of discussions still ongoing on how this impacts GAC Advice, Early Warnings, Singular/Plural TLDs, Application Changes, Objections Handling, Responding to Public Comments.



Discussions Since ICANN 80



Singular / Plural

- One of the few non-adopted Recommendations from SubPro which prohibited the delegation of singular and plural versions of the same string *except where the strings have different intended uses*.
 - ICANN Board Resolution re – content has has great impact on the notion of “intended use.”
 - GNSO Council Small Team still trying to figure out a way to continue to prohibit Singulars and Plurals while at the same time coming up with an objective, enforceable mechanism, to all some singulars/plurals to co-exist where no likelihood of confusion.



GAC Advice ICANN 80

1. Do not do ASP on first-come, first-served basis as it may discriminate against certain regions who may find out later than others or who cant apply right away.
2. ICANN must prohibit the use of private auctions in resolving contention sets in the next round and to start a discussion on alternatives especially where there is a non-profit applicant.



Since ICANN 80

1. ICANN Board meetings with GAC on ASP Program and Resolution of Contention Sets
2. IRT continues to cover multiple topics in preparation for public comment periods including one shortly on Ts and Cs.
3. Small Team+ still working on Singular/Plural issues.
