

TERRI AGNEW: Good morning, good afternoon and good evening. Welcome to the AFRALO Website Brainstorm Session, taking place on Friday 14<sup>th</sup> of August 2015 at 17:00 UTC. On the English channel we have Tijani Ben Jemaa. On the French channel we have Aziz Hilali. I show no apologies for today's meeting. From staff we have Laura Bengford, Ariel Liang, Silvia Vivanco, Jeff Salem, and myself, Terri Agnew.

ARIEL LIANG: I think there's some problem with Terri's connection.

TIJANI BEN JEMAA: I apologize. My audio dropped. Our French interpreter today is Isabelle. I'd like to remind all [participants to please state your name before speaking, not only for transcription purposes but also for our interpreter. Thank you very much.

ARIEL LIANG: Thank you very much Terri. Today we seem to have a very intimate group, so we can have a very relaxed discussion about the At-Large website. We have a quick status update from Laura about what we have about the project, and then we'll go straight into the brainstorming session. Laura?

LAURA BENGFORD: Thank you Ariel. Before we get started with our intimate conversation here today, with you, Tijani, and Aziz, we wanted to provide you with a

quick status update on where we are with the website. Following BA where we provided the demonstration to you all, we've made additional progress that we'd like to share with you today. Ariel is showing the new At-Large website that's in progress. It's not live, so you'll see the message up there that makes sure everyone knows that it's an alpha test site there. I know, Tijani, you don't have the video, but I'll just be talking through the progress we've made over the past month.

Primarily, we've been finishing up some final items on the policy advice. What we've done, fairly recently - actually this past week - is we have all of the public comment data coming over from ICANN.org that is working. We're very pleased with how that is working, and what we're showing on the screen is the very latest policy advice statements, and where they are in their progress. You'll see on the screen, and we can send screenshots maybe to you afterwards, Tijani, is the latest policy advice and status.

On the left-hand side, where we have the pie chart, we had in BA four of the topics linked, and we're completing all the remaining topic detail pages, so we'll have a link out to introduce that topic and automatically pull in all of the statements relating to that topic. The main thing we're focusing on at this time is the regional activities. It's part of the reason we felt it was so important to reach out to all the RALOs and really try to understand what each RALO finds important, what information and data should be on the RALO landing page, and also differentiate what should be on the website, versus the Wiki.

We'll be asking you a few questions today and asking you to just comment on what your thoughts, ideas, and feedback are on that. Ariel

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and I have done a little bit of analysis on what's out there for each of the RALO pages on the Wiki, and we'll also be sharing with you some of that analysis to prompt the discussion today. Ariel, in the final band, just a quick teaser - we have actually included all of the Working Groups, Task Forces and Sub Committees under the Outreach and Engagement, and these will link out to the Wiki.

Then at the bottom we're starting on a featured event, so we'll be able to either hand-curate, or pull in from the existing Google Calendar events that are important; such as the upcoming ICANN Dublin Meeting and maybe some other important events or activities. We're still very much working through how that's going to work, and that's the status update for today. I think we're going to go right into the questions.

The first thing that, as I mentioned before, we really want to understand is if Tijani and Aziz could maybe talk about what the primary role, in your view, of the RALO is, and what are the key issues and/or activities happening in your region that we should be focusing on and presenting on the website. Speaking about those activities, which ones maybe happen on a regular basis and which ones happen ad-hoc? At this point, I'm going to turn it over to you, Ariel, to facilitate discussion and gather some input on those two questions. Thank you.

ARIEL LIANG:

Thanks Laura. Aziz and Tijani, feel free to speak up. There's no formality to this meeting. Question one is about the primary role of AFRALO. Any comments on this?

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TIJANI BEN JEMAA:

I can start. I think that it is a good idea to make the regional At-Large structure visible at the website level, and I think that for AFRALO, for example, we need to have at least the presentation of all the ALSes, and try to put on the website the basic mechanism of working between the RALOs, the ALSes, and ALAC. Also, perhaps we'll need to put the activities of the RALO on the website and make links to the activities of all the ALSes on the ground in their countries, and in At-Large, in ICANN. Thank you.

ARIEL LIANG:

Thank you Tijani. I'll get back to you on what you commented on. Let's go to Aziz now.

AZIZ HILARIEL LIANG:

Thank you Ariel. As you mentioned, this discussion is quite intimate because there are only two of us on this call, and staff, but let us try to contribute as much as we can. As far as I'm concerned, as a Member of AFRALO, I agree with the idea. I really like what you've done. What I would add is similar to what Tijani said. I expressed this before. I wish for each ALS to have a form that it tells how it's organized, its objectives, its mission, the different people who are in charge of this ALS, who organize the work, and also I'd like to have a space provided for each ALS to contribute.

In other words, it's a way for them to post their activities on a regular basis. The question was asked earlier, as far as the events that are happening in Africa on a regular basis. Of course, the great event was the African Summit. It usually takes place every year between May or

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June. This year it was in Tunisia. The year before that it was in Mauritius. This event is very important, because it gathers all of the different organizations in Africa that are involved in the Internet. It's called [SR 00:11:10] and AFRALO was involved this year.

It was actually the first time that we cooperated our group; that we were gathered there during this very large event, where all of the Africans, even though they might not be represented by an ALS, are present there. So I think that as officers of AFRALO it's a means for us to be there, to be present, and try and recruit new ALSes. I think this is something that needs to be reflected on the website. For other events, I think it's up to us, within AFRALO, to give the space for that. That's my answer to the first question. Thank you for listening.

ARIEL LIANG:

Thank you very much Aziz and Tijani for both of your comments. I think the first point you shared, Aziz, is about the website, and we need to give a space to promote the ALSes and let them explain what they do and how they're organized. Just to bring your attention to the existing Wiki page - we jumped a little in this discussion - there is a Wiki page for AFRALO ALSes. I'm showing that on the screen right now. Unfortunately Tijani can't see that, but on that page we have the ALS name and logo, and some of the provided their profile in a very concise way.

We're just wondering whether it would be sufficient to migrate this information to the website, so we at least have something to start with? As you may be aware, our goal is to launch the beta site in Dublin, and

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there will be limited capability to allow a lot of community members to have admin access to the web page. But we can roll that out in the future, it just probably can't be done by Dublin. Probably we can start something like having the basic information of ALSes, and in the future we can look at the possibility to give them more flexibility to update their activities. Of course, we can link out to their own website if they publicize their activities and information there. Laura, please go ahead.

LAURA BENGFORD: Thank you. I'm very curious to ask and further elaborate on the existing activities within the ALSes today. Where are these? Are they on the Google Calendar, the existing At-Large calendar, are they on their own website? How do these groups organize, and how would we maybe even - as Ariel mentioned, it won't be at beta - but how in the future can we organize and get access to the events going on within the actual ALSes?

ARIEL LIANG: Thanks Laura. Aziz?

AZIZ HILARIEL LIANG: Yes. To answer the question, I'm not sure who asked the question. Was it Laura? Anyway, we have a lot of difficulties, let's face it, because the ALSes are not necessarily good at posting information on what you're showing right now. It's difficult for them to post their activities, but they do have activities - they do organize events. But what we'd like is for

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them to be involved in such a way that they are able to contribute, to give their input on the website. However, it's not happening.

Even though they're very active, they don't necessarily post this on the website. So when we give them an opportunity to talk, when we have a monthly call, we realize they are very active. But the action of going on the website is a different step. As I'm speaking, I'm thinking about how we can possibly find a way that links their website, so that when something happens it would appear automatically? So for example, there was an event organized, an IGF Meeting, that took place in Addis Ababa.

There are many things being organized in Africa. However, unfortunately, the problem is to find the resources, the people, who can communicate that. You should, on the website, Ariel, it's good, but I think at the very top you could show the document that we produced. Yes. You can see it now. This document was sent to staff, and there is very recent information, and what I've asked was to at least include that information, to update that, towards the bottom. You have the information at the bottom that's related to the ALSes.

The document is up-to-date, but the information at the bottom is old. This most recent document was done in 2014, in order to collect information from the ALSes. I think there is a lot of work yet to be done. This is something we need to work on as AFRALO, but I think staff can also help, in order for all the information to be updated. Thank you very much.

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ARIEL LIANG: Thank you very much Aziz. Tijani?

TIJANI BEN JEMAA: Yes, the activities of the ALSes are not documented now. Even if we have our Wikis and we want to have it updated there, we've created a new Wiki so that they put their activities there, but they don't do. Tell you the truth, even my ALS - I have organized events - it's not months since I've updated the list of activities of my ALS. It is a problem of bandwidth, that's right, but it's also a matter of how people think or feel that it's useful to do so.

Fist of all, I'd like to say that on the website I don't want to see the activities or the details of the activities of the RALO or the ALSes. It will be a landing page of the RALO where we have links to everything. We need to have all the certified ALSes on this landing page with links to each with a presentation of the ALSes. I think we need to have the activities of the RALO on this page, which is very important, and we need to have a link to the activities of the ALSes. Since we'll have the list of the certified ALSes, [unclear 00:19:58] the name of the ALS will bring us to the Wiki, where you have the presentation and where you have the activities of the ALS.

There is a big inreach work to do for our ALSes, to make them more productive in the sense of having the activities documented. But I don't think we need to put it on the website. I think the website is more for visibility of the RALOs and ALSes. So the activities of the RALOs will be on this page, on this website. The list of the ALSes also will be there, and

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a link to each ALS where you can find their presentation and their activities.

ARIEL LIANG: Thank you very much Tijani for the comments about the activities of ALSes. Laura, would you like to respond to any of the comments from Aziz and Tijani?

LAURA BENGFORD: I think what you both mentioned makes sense. What Ariel and I were already thinking of is this page that's out there right now that lists all the ALSes, and the link out to their site is what we were thinking would be the right thing to do; to provide that visibility and linking out to the individual events. I think that's a good place to start. I think we'll see how that goes, and further elaborate and iterate on additional capabilities as we move forward. I think that's good, and it's very helpful for us to hear and confirm that that's what we need to have there.

I'd like to go onto the next question, which is focusing on is it important to see other regional activities? If so, what would you like to see? For example, is it important for you to look at another RALO, such as EURALO or LACRALO to see what activities they're doing, to get ideas or have some commonality? We're very curious to hear if you have any interest in that? If so, what would that be? Thank you.

TIJANI BEN JEMAA: Thank you. Laura, I don't understand your question well. If each region has its own page, we can go to that page. It's different. I don't think it is

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with a login and password. Everyone can access it. It is full visibility, so it will not be forbidden to visit it. All activities of the other regions will be accessible for all the other regions. I don't understand your question exactly.

LAURA BENGFORD: Just to clarify, yes, you would have visibility to all of the other RALO pages, so that's not an issue. Maybe that's just it. I was just curious to see how important it is, and how often you would look at regional activities on those other pages? We would expect everything to be completely open to everybody.

TIJANI BEN JEMAA: Exactly. But I have another suggestion. We may have regional activities as regions, for example as Africa or Latin America - not strictly the At-Large. I mean the events where we participate as At-Large Members may be reported and may have visibility on this page, where every time, for example, we go to an AFRINIC Meeting, I think it's good to have a link or more information about AFRINIC events during this event. Visibility for the regional activities that are not especially At-Large could also be useful for the region in general, for the RALO.

LAURA BENGFORD: Yes.

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- ARIEL LIANG: Thank you very much Tijani. Silvia made a comment here in the chat. She was wondering whether we were referring to some cross-regional projects. So to give you an example, LACRALO has this LAC ICANN and LACRALO partnership, in a way, that they developed this Capacity Building Program and have webinars for just the LACRALO region, and APRALO has something similar. It's the APRALO APAC Hub Pilot Framework, and they also have this Capacity Building Webinar. Even though these two programs take place in two different RALOs, they have some commonalities. Maybe this is something AFRALO can think about, and especially for...
- TERRI AGNEW: We have lost our interpreter on the French side, and Aziz is on the French side. Do you mind if we pause for a moment?
- ARIEL LIANG: Go ahead.
- TERRI AGNEW: They've been able to reconnect. Please continue. I apologize for the interruption.
- ARIEL LIANG: Thank you very much. Tijani?

TIJANI BEN JEMAA:

I have a comment about what Silvia said. Of course, any cross-RALO activities should be on the page of the At-Large in general, or of ALAC. This is common work of the whole At-Large people. Second point, regarding the capacity building done or the webinars done by LACRALO or APRALO, I think we're now discussing this deeply in the Capacity Building Working Group, since there is Capacity Building Working Group for At-Large.

Normally, any activity of capacity building should go through the Capacity Building Working Group, and in this case it should be visible for all the regions, because it's At-Large. It's not a regional activity, it will be an At-Large one. Even if this activity concerns only one region, but is organized by the Capacity Building Working Group, it will be available for the whole At-Large people. This is a discussion now, and I hope it will be solved in this way. Otherwise, any cross-RALO activity should be on the page of the ALAC and At-Large in general. Thank you.

ARIEL LIANG:

Thank you very much Tijani. Aziz, do you have any comments on question number three?

AZIZ HILARIEL LIANG:

Yes. I would like to confirm... Sorry, I have a really bad echo.

ARIEL LIANG:

Aziz, we wish we could understand French, but there are really bad audio issues.

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AZIZ HILARIEL LIANG: I can try in English, if you want.

ARIEL LIANG: It's okay Aziz, we will fix it momentarily. Just one moment.

AZIZ HILARIEL LIANG: I had a bad connection. Okay, she's online. I want to say that the relationship with... The top-bottom relationship - I was talking about the different ALSes - and how they're successful, for example, in Latin America, depended upon for example communication with... What I mean is that there could be a relationship between the different ALSes in Africa and in Latin America, for example. As we said earlier, there are gatherings, there are meetings, that we all attend. There is a lot of interaction between the different RALOs. So we are informed, we know what's going on.

So I think it would be a good idea to look for partnerships - say to use such and such experiments that work well in Africa, and apply it in Latin America, in order to make the most of what was done. That's what I wanted to say.

ARIEL LIANG: Thank you very much Aziz. Due to the interest of time, I think we should move to question four, because we do have a few other questions to ask you in this meeting. Question number four we have is that we know AFRALO has a Wiki page, and it has a lot of information posted there. If

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we view this AFRALO web page, some of the content may be migrated to the web. To do that, we did a bit of analysis beforehand. I'm going to paste this in the Google spreadsheet Laura and I did. I'm going to paste it in the chat. Terri, can you send this link to Tijani through Skype, so Tijani can look at this document as well?

This document shows what the current content is that's posted in the AFRALO Wiki page, and you can probably see on the screen, on column A, ICANN-related information; like the URL of the ICANN website, or the web page of ICANNLearn, et cetera. These links are posted currently on the AFRALO Wiki page. The second column you'll see is the At-Large general information. For example, on the AFRALO page we have the At-Large website, which is the current old website, and we also have some Wiki pages like the At-Large policy development workspace.

So that information is also on the AFRALO Wiki page, and they're not specific to the RALO itself, but it has a implication to the whole At-Large community. That's the information in the second column. The third column is the RALO-specific information. What we mean here is that those categories of information really just concern the RALO itself, but then at the same time, almost all the RALOs have the same category of information.

For example, each RALO has a Wiki page for their own ALSes, and they also have a Wiki page indicating the regional officers. Then they also have the meetings, transcripts, et cetera. So this is the RALO-specific information, but they're shared across the whole community. Then the last column you'll see is called the AFRALO-specific information. That means those things are unique to AFRALO itself. For example, the

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AFRALO-AfrICANN Joint Meeting. This is something AFRALO has been doing for many years, and of course they have a presence on the Wiki, and we can see the transcript, relevant information about the meetings, as well as the statements and declarations that were issued during the meetings. This is AFRALO-unique information.

Now, what we do with this analysis... What we want you to think about is to look at the third column, which is the RALO-specific information, and also the last column; AFRALO-specific information. Think which ones you think would be best to migrate to the web page, so that they have more prominence and will be easily found by a newcomer, for example. I'd like to take a moment. You can look at this spreadsheet and give us feedback you have, and anything that jumps to your mind; you can shout it out and let us know. Aziz, please go ahead.

AZIZ HILARIEL LIANG:

Thank you very much. I'd like to now mention something. Thank you Ariel for all of the work that you did. What's a little concerning on the Wiki, as far as AFRALO is concerned, is the following. As far as the newcomers are concerned, they need to be able to find training easily. Maybe this is something that's surprising, but even I, as an old-comer, I sometimes have issues when trying to find the information I need as far as training is concerned, because the AFRALO page is a bit messy as far as the hierarchy of the Wiki page.

For example, the AFRALO AfrICANN Meetings are not organized. There is not one single link where I can find all of the different meetings for AFRALO AfrICANN. I cannot find one specific part where all the

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showcases are displayed in a streamlined way. I think there's a lot of work to do in order for anybody, whether a newcomer or not, to find the links. They need to be organized better. They need to be organized by themes, by activities. If you type "AFRALO.org" you'll find all kinds of things, but in no specific order, with no organization.

So for example, if someone would like to have information on things that were done previously, old information, it would be difficult. I can get to the Dakar Meeting - this is something that happened in 2011. If you go further down, I find Showcase information. So I'll find the Showcase, but if I'm looking for another Showcase, it's not there. In other words, it's a little bit messy. I like what you presented, but I'd like to stress the fact that we did a lot of things. There are African statements that were done.

I'd like for them to be organized in the site, so that when a newcomer is coming, he or she might easily find where the information is. He might be informed about AFRALO. I'd like for him to be able to find out how to become a Member, what the structure is, what the current issues are, the comment periods that are going on, and so forth. There are a lot of flyers I think should be posted as well, but as you know, you have to ask the AFRALO Officers to update those as well. That's what I wanted to mention. Thank you very much.

ARIEL LIANG:

Thank you very much Aziz. Tijani or Beran, do you have comments?

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TIJANI BEN JEMAA:

Since I didn't see the spreadsheet you're presenting, I can't comment a lot on it, but I can say that yes, we'll need [unclear 00:412:10] before we get into the website. Aziz raised the point of management in general, and this is a general problem. I remember in Singapore there was a public session about it, and it seems that everyone in ICANN has the same problem to find information. What we can do, since we're now doing a new thing for the RALO, I think before doing anything we have to set a structure of [coding 00:41:52] the documents.

If we agree on this strategy, it will be very easy to find documents when we want to see them. If we don't all agree on the same strategy, we will never manage to have something where any document you want, you can get to very easily. Thank you.

ARIEL LIANG:

Thank you very much Tijani. Beran, do you have comments? In the meantime, I'm going to respond to what Tijani and Aziz said about the Wiki with regards to organization. I think that definitely goes hand-in-hand with this development of the new web page. It would be very helpful if the Wiki is organized, and it would be easy to identify the information. I think what we did here, the analysis gives a little more structure to the current information posted in the AFRALO Wiki page. Maybe this is something we can start with.

At the same time, it may be a little out of scope of the website redesign project. I think what we really need help with is to first pick the top, first category of information that you think would be very good to have on the web, so that we'll have the AFRALO page, to have something there.

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Then we can keep iterating on that while reorganizing the information on the Wiki. That being said, we'll have a little homework for you after this meeting, and we'll send you a survey that was built based on this spreadsheet.

There are 16 types of information, and you could check the top eight that you think would be good to have on the website. Based on that, we'll be able to create a mockup or some other design idea for the website. So we'll have something to start with, and we'll have more to present to you after that is done. We'll follow up with you after this meeting on that. Okay, due to the interest of time, I think we probably need to move onto the next set of questions.

The next question we have already addressed. It's about what we should have on ALSes. We're going to skip that question and go to question number six, which is about the social media. When we were doing analysis for the EURALO page, we noticed EURALO has their own social media sites like Facebook and LinkedIn. We're just curious whether AFRALO has any social media accounts for AFRALO itself? If so, would you like to have that placed in a prominent place on the AFRALO web page?

TIJANI BEN JEMAA:

As for the social media, I do agree with you. I think that first of all, there is work done, and you are doing it, for the At-Large in general. But there is nothing for our region, for the regions, is there? So if people feel the need and they think it's a real need now to have our own Twitter page or social media in general, developing social media tools would be very

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good. If we managed to do so, we'd need to have it linked to our web page. Thank you.

ARIEL LIANG: Thank you Tijani. Any more comments, from Aziz?

AZIZ HILARIEL LIANG: I really like the idea, as Tijani said, to have a Twitter feed, a Facebook page. It would be a lot easier for people to contribute through Facebook. I think it would increase the level of contributions, so I think it's a good idea. Why not?

ARIEL LIANG: Thank you Aziz. Of course, if AFRALO decides to do that then we need to figure out who's going to do that - whether it's the community members, and volunteers, or whether staff would contribute and manage the content. That's probably something we want to think about. Let's move to the next question, which is about translation for the web page. I know that AFRALO works in both French and English, and I know a lot of the documents are translated into French when in English, and vice versa.

For the web page, would you also like to have both languages shown? Also, the background information is that if we are going to launch the beta in Dublin, it's less than two months, so it may be a little technically difficult to translate everything, but there's a possibility that we can install a plug-in for machine translation. That's the minimum we could do. Is that something feasible? Aziz?

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AZIZ HILARIEL LIANG: Thank you Ariel. As far as translation, you know that at AFRALO we use French quite a bit, and so I'd like to mention the fact that it would be very difficult to translate the AfrICANN AFRALO statement. It was a very important statement. We asked for it to be translated, and we waited much longer than one week in order for two pages to be translated. I think this is an important fact. French is important for the Wiki page. French is important for any document that comes out of AFRALO. It is something that's very important.

Sometimes you ask the community, you ask the Members in the ALSes to contribute, and they are sent the document in English. So we ask them to comment on the document, which is in English, and a lot of people will say, "I can't, because the document is in English only, and so I cannot contribute." I'd like to stress the fact that the most important thing is documents needed to be translated quickly. There was another document by the ICG, and I think Jean-Jacques Subrenat asked that, based on the document that was published in BA - it was a statement done by AfrICANN, AFRALO - he asked for it to be translated in all the UN languages, and so far we have not had the translation.

I think Silvia was copied on this, if I'm not mistaken. Yes, so I do want to stress the fact that at least in the second language, in French, we need to have the translation done. There are a larger number of French speakers than there are English, so it's very important. Thank you.

ARIEL LIANG: Thank you Aziz. Tijani?

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TIJANI BEN JEMAA:

Thank you Ariel. Translation is very important for AFRALO, as you know, since predominantly our community is in two parts, and they are equal parts. There are as many English-speaking people as French-speaking people, so we cannot neglect one or the other. I think that for our website we do need both languages. You will ask me how to do this, since by Dublin we'll not have time to translate everything. That's right. Please don't make use of the machine translation, because it is catastrophic. Sometimes it gives you the reverse meaning of what you wanted to say. So please avoid it. Please try to translate as much as you can, but have real translated documents, not machine translated.

I think that for the AFRALO production we are always producing in both languages. If you need help, I don't have a lot of time, I'll not be able to translate, but I can give you the feeling whether the document you are providing is near to the original one or is far from it. I can do that. I think there is some of our community who can do that. But in the future, the fact that we'll have only one language, we'll not have it at all. Thank you.

ARIEL LIANG:

Thank you very much Tijani, and thank you Aziz for your comment too. We understand it's very important for AFRALO to have both languages. I think the first step for a successful translation is to identify what information we need to put on the website, and based on that we'll be able to effectively provide the right language version to also put it on the website. For Dublin, we have less than two months.

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We also had this conversation with the other RALOs - for example LACRALO, that also operates in both Spanish and English - and they understand there are time constraints and they are open to the option to have a machine translation for the beta site; just for the time being, where we don't have time to produce the human translated content, so we have something to show, or have some tools for people who don't speak English to engage. So that's a temporary solution, but we definitely take note of what you both said about the importance of French in AFRALO. We'll have some internal discussion about that and see how we can accommodate and meet the requirements.

We only have ten minutes left for the interpretation, so let's move onto the last question, which is an updated content strategy for AFRALO. As we have previously explained, for beta site there will be a limited capability for community members to log into the website and do their own updates, and for beta, staff will mainly be the people who can access the site and update content. Given that background, what type of information do you think needs to be absolutely up-to-date on the AFRALO web page?

TIJANI BEN JEMAA:

Absolutely up-to-date: our reports. Absolutely up-to-date: the status of the ALSes. Absolutely up-to-date: our contributions, such as our statements on the transition, on the accountability, et cetera. Those are the main things that we absolutely need up-to-date. For the other things, we may start with what we have and then try to update them. Thank you.

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ARIEL LIANG: Thank you Tijani. Aziz?

AZIZ HILARIEL LIANG: That is pretty much what I would have said. I think it will solve the issue that I spoke about earlier. I think that as you come onto the site, you need to be able to find all of the reports that were done. I think there are some, starting in 2009, and there are monthly reports. They are all there, but they are not in order. There are also statements. It was difficult for me earlier. I wanted to make an inventory of all of the statements that were done by AfrICANN, AFRALO, and I couldn't find them. I had a hard time finding them on the site.

I think that this task is a huge task, but it needs to be done. It needs to be updated in a chronological order, by year. There are other things that we did. For example, we did an inventory of what was done with the AfrICANN, AFRALO statements. I think that needs to be on the website as well, and I think all the flyers, all the fact sheets, all the forms that we ask the ALSes to provide, those need to be updated. I think they need to be put in there. I know this is a lot of work and requires some time, but I think this information needs to be updated, because they were provided to us, and they are part of a document that I had prepared for the London Meeting.

ARIEL LIANG: Thank you very much Aziz and Tijani for your comments. I think to do that we definitely need to work together, so maybe it will be good that

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when we have created this mock up for the AFRALO page, and when we're trying to collect all the information, I'll follow up with you or other AFRALO Members to make sure we have all the information. We can work together to identify and find where they are, so it's up-to-date. We definitely need to work together on that. Any other comments or questions? Aziz, is that an old hand or new hand?

AZIZ HILARIEL LIANG: I still have my hand up because I wanted to say I'm prepared. I have all the AFRALO, AfrICANN statements that I have ordered. I have all the fact sheets for each ALS, so don't hesitate, Ariel, to ask. I have information, I have documents that I can provide for you, to be a little easier and so we might have an ordered system for the beta version.

ARIEL LIANG: That's wonderful. Thank you very much Aziz. We'll definitely keep in touch and I'll reach out to you. Laura, do you have any other closing remarks?

LAURA BENGFORD: No, I don't have any closing remarks, except I just want to re-emphasize that this is really great feedback. For example, just with the inventory of the AFRALO statements, I think we can incorporate very easily a filtered view of the statements on the RALO page as well as the other information that we've talked about today. This is very helpful, and thank you to all who joined today. Thank you very much Aziz, Tijani, Beran, and thank you very much for your time today. We really
