ICANN's Mission Statement articulates WHAT is in scope and out of scope for ICANN. ICANN's "Core Values" articulate HOW ICANN is to carry out its Mission. The Working Party acknowledges that in some situations the Core Values may be in tension with one another, requiring a decision maker to reconcile the competing values to achieve ICANN's Mission. ICANN's current Bylaws describe this process and permit the decision maker to exercise its judgment in order to achieve "an appropriate and defensible balance among competing values." While some degree of flexibility is needed, the language in the current Bylaws provides no principled basis for reconciling the principles in any particular situation. The proposed language articulates the standard to be applied when an ICANN decision maker is required to reconcile competing values. To facilitate this process and to limit opportunities for abuse, the CCWG proposes to create a two-tiered values statement consisting of fundamental ICANN "Commitments" and "Core Values." To the extent that this kind of reconciliation would impinge on one or more of the fundamental Commitments, the proposed language would require the decision maker would be required to meet a high bar, demonstrating that any balancing is necessary and likely to achieve an important public interest goal, and narrowly tailored to achieve that goal.
