Coordinator: This call will now be recorded. You may now proceed.

Maryam Bakoshi: Thank you very much, Derek.

Good morning, good afternoon, good evening. This is the NCPH Intersessional Meeting Planning Call on Thursday, 14th of January 2016.

On the call today we have Rafik Dammak, Tapani Tarvainen, Cheryl Miller, Greg Shatan, Rudi Vasnick, Lori Schulman. And we have apologies from Phil Corwin, Tony Holmes and Marilyn Cade.

From staff we have Robert Hoggarth, Benedetta Rossi, Carlos Reyes, Ozan Sahin, Adam Peake, and myself, Maryam Bakoshi.

I would like to remind all participants to please state your name before speaking for transcription purposes. Thank you very much. Over to you, Rob.

Robert Hoggarth: Thanks very much, Maryam. Welcome everybody. Thank you all for being able to join today. I do note that because this was sort of our regular call time,

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we did end up with a slight conflict with the GNSO Council meeting. So we

do have a couple of the councilors not in attendance, but I think we have a

good turnout and good coverage from all of you. So I wanted to go ahead with

this, our penultimate call, in hopes that we can have everything crystallized

and finalized for you by the call next week.

I'd ask if you're not speaking please be on mute or just try to avoid typing so

we don't have the background noise. That would be super.

I'd like to follow the normal arc of our agendas that we have been practicing

over the last several weeks. We've added a couple little extra components

here, but it's the same general arc. I'll go over an update of the logistics with

you. We'll talk about the invited guests and what their status is; I think we're

on good track there. We'll review the - any goal and programming matter

discussions and talk about, you know, nailing down the call for next week.

We'll throw in any other business.

Is there anything else that anyone would like to add that we're missing? I think

most of the questions are going to be in a logistics or programming area. So

let's see if we have some time at the end we can add any additional

components. But I think we pretty much got the ground covered there.

Is there anything though, any burning issues that anyone would like to add to

the agenda just to make sure that we get it covered today? I'll wait a moment

for hands or for folks to come off mute. Okay, let's proceed.

Nothing new, I don't think, to report in terms of specific logistics for the hotel

or for the meetings space. Chantelle and Maryam are working with a number

of you for specific planning for Wednesday, and I appreciate their

coordination with Susie Johnson in the Los Angeles office of ICANN. As you

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all nail down the timing and the locations and the number of people that are going to be participating in those events, you're doing a great job of sharing that with Chantelle and Maryam. So thank you for that.

Please continue to do that. We'd like to be able to know at least the general perimeters of your meetings, again, time, how many people, and what else you may need, by the end of our call next week. We understand a couple of you have some issues there that might drag that out just a bit. But we want to give you as many options and be able to comply with as many of your needs as possible, and the earlier we know obviously the better in that regard.

There was an issue with respect travel that I wanted you to address that, Benedetta, if you could, because I know you've been in touch with Joseph De Jesus and the travel team. Could you explain to folks what the airline reservations versus hotel accommodation arrangements are so that folks have some comfort that if they don't have hotel information yet that they're going to be covered? Can you touch on that for just a bit for us?

Benedetta Rossi: Yes of course. This is Benedetta speaking for the transcript. Yes I've been dealing with Joseph very closely about the - just the travel logistics to make sure that everyone's travel and hotel bookings are covered, and the feedback that I received is that they don't - the constituency travel does not send off any ad hoc hotel reservation codes. It's all sent off as a group.

> So it's not surprising that you haven't yet received any of your bookings, because I think they're still finalizing a couple of the travel in terms of the airline bookings for some of the members. Some people were only confirmed on Friday, so there's been a delay in terms of that.

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And then the list has been sent off to the hotel and then constituency travel is waiting for the hotel to come back with their finalized list. So once that's completed by the hotel, then all of the hotel bookings will be sent as a group

to all of the attendees. I'm not entirely sure what the timeframe is for this, but

it should - obviously it will happen in time for the intersessional.

I think Lori you had a question.

Lori Schulman: Yes I have a question. I'm sorry, I should have raised my hand. My apologies.

I'm a little confused because I sent an e-mail to Joseph and I said that I would

pay personally for an additional night because I'm going to come in the

Tuesday rather than the Wednesday morning.

So I sent him an e-mail saying if that extra night is added to just the room

order and then I pay for it separately when I arrive, or do I need to make a

whole separate hotel reservation myself for the night before. And I didn't get a

response back, and I'm not clear about what I'm supposed to do.

Benedetta Rossi: Okay let me just look into that, because I was CCed on that communication.

So let me just have a look.

Lori Schulman: Yes, thank you.

Robert Hoggarth: Thanks, Benedetta. And of course...

Benedetta Rossi: Now you said - I'm sorry. Lori, I saw a reply from him that just says that if

you want to stay at the same hotel on the second, just let them know. So let

constituency travel know, and they will extend the hotel and they'll you be

financially responsible for the extra night.

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Lori Schulman: Oh okay. Because I wasn't clear, because I wrote back I'd be happy to pay. So

is that I had to say? That's what I'm confused about.

Benedetta Rossi: Yes.

Lori Schulman: Okay. Then we're good. Thanks very much.

Benedetta Rossi: In any case, Joseph - once they've got everything finalized with the hotel, he'll

send a list to me. So I'll make sure to double check that you're booked in for

the extra night as well.

Lori Schulman: Oh, thank you so much.

Benedetta Rossi: No problem.

Lori Schulman: And if you need the payment information, I'd be happy to call the hotel and

give it or give it you privately. Just let me know what you need. That's all.

Benedetta Rossi: Perfect. Thank you.

Robert Hoggarth: Great. This is Rob. Thank you both for that. Yes and please, I think it is important, when that stuff comes out, please encourage your delegates to look

at it quickly. You know, the goal is 100% accuracy. The practice doesn't seem

to ever achieve that, so being able to quickly resolve any issues where

someone's got a night wrong or something like that, please have your

delegates do that for us.

There were a couple of items that I wanted to make sure that we talked about

that I think are not only awareness items but feedback that from a staff

perspective we'd like to get from you all. We've established through the first

two meetings a couple of default expectations, but those are just default. They

can be adjusted and changed.

And a couple of questions have come up from some of you and elsewhere

from folks who aren't even involved with the NCPH. And I want to make sure

that we're resolving those consistently so that we're all sort of aware of how

the logistics are being set up here.

Somebody had asked, "Well gee, why isn't this meeting being promoted? You

know, I want to sit in. I'm from the registries. I want to see what's going on."

And what we've told people for the first two meetings, sort of a track record

that was established, is this is a meeting of the community.

And while we're making remote participation available for folks to observe

the meeting from the community that's having the meeting, the NCPH, that

people are welcome after the meeting to review the recordings, the transcripts,

the chat, and the recordings as well, but we're not making this meeting open

and available to people outside the NCPH community.

We are considering -- and this is up to you all; I want to have this as an action

item question -- posting the fact that the meeting is taking place on the GNSO

calendar but not providing any detailed information outside what we already

have on the wiki space. As I directed on a couple of occasions, links in some

of communications to you, we do have on the community wiki a space for this

meeting as well as the archived information from the past few meetings.

So anyone who's interested or has curiosity about what you're talking about,

what transpires, if they want to review transcripts afterwards, that's totally

open and transparent. What we've tried to do, based on the feedback from you

and your predecessors, is make sure that the in-person face-to-face meeting

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experience fulfills what your intending it to fulfill, which is that you are all getting together, that you have the ability to build relationships, have conversations in real time face to face.

And that's something that does get challenged when people who aren't a part of that community are involved, or sometimes -- and you all know this experience as I do -- when you're trying to participate remotely in the meeting, it just becomes very difficult, particularly when you've got an all-day session, to be able to realistically participate on a real-time basis.

So what we have set up in terms of our planning and talking with IT is that we will have the capability to live stream for members of your community who can't be there in person but are interested in what's going on. The chat will be available so that people can, you know, make comments for the record. So that's available for people to see.

We imagine that a number of you are going to be in the remote participation Adobe Connect room as well, and through your instant messaging and everything else, members of your community who aren't there physically will be able to share comments with you, allow you to express them in the meeting so that they can be on the recording, to the extent that that's necessary.

So that's the approach that we're taking. I wanted to make sure that I outline that to you all so that you could explain that to your members. And if you're inclined to expand things, object to this arrangement, tweak it, evolve in any way, shape, or form, we can sort of vet that with you all on this call and next week.

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So does anyone have comments or thoughts about whether that's a good idea,

that I'm crazy to continue to that, or that we should make any adjustments to

that approach? I'll wait for hands or folks to come off mute.

Seeing nothing and hearing nothing at the moment, I will take that as we have

general consensus that that's the approach that we'll continue to take here in

terms of the actual meeting participation. Please feel free to raise that again if

anyone from your community expresses a concern from either a delegate

standpoint or someone who wants to participate remotely. But I appreciate

you letting me share that with you.

One of the things that I also flagged in our most recent communication was

the brainstorm that I introduced several calls ago about the prospects of

potentially a pre-meeting meeting, or a pre-meeting webinar, whatever you

want to call it, where those of your delegates who for whom this is the first

time at the intersessional meeting, for folks who are just new to your

leadership who want to get a better comfort level about what this meeting is

about and how it's going to run and how it's going to take place, we would

have a call the week before the meeting.

It could be just 30 minutes. I don't think it needs to be anything elaborate. But

just an opportunity for folks to touch base and learn a little bit about the scope

and arc of the meeting. Do you all have an interest in us doing that? Do you

think that would be of value? Do you have anyone who you think might take

us up on that?

I'm happy to take any comments or observations you all have on this call, or if

you'd like to take that back to your communities and share your point of view

next week, that's fine too. It's something we can pull together I think relatively

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quickly. Thanks for your checkmark on that, Rudi. My - I take that as a positive comment, yes that might be a good think to have the call.

It's nothing that any of you would have to attend if you didn't want to. It would just be available for folks. And if that's something that you think would be of value even to one person in your delegation, Benedetta and I are more than happy to have a one-on-one or a two-on-one call with somebody just to give them a perspective on that in addition to the meeting materials that are going to be on the wiki page.

Rudi, I see your hand is up. I'll turn the mic over to you sir.

Rudi Vasnick:

Thank you, Robert. Rudi for the transcript. Well with regard to the organizational aspects of the meeting itself, I had a discussion yesterday with Robert and Maryam and Benedetta on several other elements. We discussed also about the structure organization of the two days and the day before.

And so far, it seems we're not really clear, and perhaps it's something we have to keep note of and - for the future. Clearer guidelines on what can be done, what cannot be done, what can be organized, what is the duty of the constituency, what is the duty of ICANN staff, so that we are not waiting for each other.

NPOC scheduled for the Wednesday before noon an ExCom meeting preparing the NCPH, because it's, again, good to be physically together and finalize the goals and objectives for the two days. In the afternoon we want to reach out, as we are in L.A., do some outreach efforts to NGOs that are in L.A. or around L.A. and are willing to join us in the discussion. That's how we scheduled the Wednesday.

But as I'm still in contact with Maryam day to day to see how we organize, how we set it up and then all the logistics around, I think it's good if that could be, for the future, in a kind of template so that we don't need to meet again.

Robert Hoggarth: Thanks, Rudi. And I appreciate you reinforcing that and sort of giving me a little segue to Wednesday. Those of you who've been involved in the meetings and the meeting planning in the past, what I - what you've observed is that -- I mean this is only the third time we've done this meeting -- and what was very interesting and I think quite dynamic that took place at the meeting last January here in D.C. was this concept where, you know, it looked like, particularly with the attendees and a number of them here in the D.C. area not even having to do anything but sleep in their own beds, that it was a really great opportunity to take advantage of the presence in Washington to have an extra day. And that ended up being the Friday of that week.

> And we talked about it from a planning perspective. And it ended up being a really great, and I think productive, brainstorm that we were able to implement to say, "Yes let's extend the travel support so that we can basically have and take advantage of the fact that you are all in the same city."

And so we were able to do that. And the general attitude there was you guys do what you want on that day. It's your day. Your, you know, your people, your delegates, are allowed to stick around for an extra day and travel back the subsequent day after.

And now it's a little bit different just because we slid the meeting later in the week so that we had the opportunity for Fadi and David and others to participate. It's now the first meeting - I'm sorry, the first day. Again the approach that we've taken, and we should think about this, Rudi, for meeting number four, is that that's your guys' day.

You could choose to do nothing. You could choose to, you know, have a large

all-day meeting where you all go and tour around L.A. to meeting with

various prospective members, or to have folks come and meet with you in a

particular location.

The twist I think that we've had for the second iteration or evolution of that

concept is that many of you don't have bases of operation in L.A. And so, you

know, what we've done is worked with Susie and other members of ICANN

staff in Los Angeles to make sure that we've got meeting space available to

you that you might otherwise have used from a trade association or a think

tank or a law firm where somebody else with whom you were associated with

in your community.

So that's a long way of getting around, Rudi, to the point that the day is your

day. You all may want to coordinate, as I know some of you have been having

these conversations, as an NCSG group, as a CSG group, for what you might

do together. But that's, you know, that's something that you all can do on your

own.

And Benedetta and I have had conversations with Maryam and Chantelle to

encourage them to work directly with you as chairs or meeting planners to

work out those individual community meeting arrangements. Just like you

would have any other phone call, it's just now you have the opportunity to do

it in person.

I think it's really exciting, Rudi, the fact that you're thinking about being able

to do some outreach. I know that Adam Peake, who's on the call today and

who's been observing us throughout the course of the planning effort, is also

going to be in Los Angeles. And I think he's had some conversation with folks

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about the potential for other outreach type events that Adam and Jean-Jacques

Sahel may be able to work with and coordinate with you all on.

So I mean, please continue to think in that vein, but please also understand

based on our evolution and the budgets that we develop that we're not in a

position from a staff perspective other than what we're trying to do in terms of

finding meeting space at the ICANN offices or set up an extra spot at the

Doubletree with a phone or something like that, we're not able to provide

financial resource support for those types of activities.

That may be something that we look toward for meeting number four and

beyond. It's not something that we have the flexibility to do this time around.

So I hope that that was responsive to your comments and observations, Rudi.

And if that prompted anyone else, please just in the queue, raise your hand, or

speak up.

Benedetta, I'm going to forward real quickly an e-mail from Tony Holmes to

you just for you to be able to send the connection information to Jen Taylor.

So if I could shoot that to you, that would be really great just so that she can

join us.

Jennifer Taylor:

I actually got it. Thank you. It was sent. (Unintelligible) e-mail.

Robert Hoggarth: Oh great.

Jennifer Taylor:

So I managed to get on. Thank you though. I appreciate it.

Robert Hoggarth: All right. Thank you. I'm sorry. It's hard to multi-task when I'm also looking at

the chat and everything else. Thank you.

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Jennifer Taylor: No thank you.

Robert Hoggarth: And thanks, Rudi, for your comment in the chat about the meeting room in the L.A. office. We'll take that as a parking lot item that Maryam and (Susie) can talk about.

> All right. Otherwise in terms of prep and getting things together, we're trying to coordinate very closely with Maryam and Chantelle for your respective communities, so please continue to work through them on any detailed arrangements that you have not only for Wednesday but for your breakout sessions.

Because one of the areas that we have been pushing back to them on that you're probably then hearing from the secretariat team is if you are intending to have briefings from ICANN staff, I'd like to try to nail that all down pretty quickly. Just with, you know, travel schedules and things like that, I want to make sure that there's actually someone available to assist you guys and make and provide the briefings. I just want to be careful about schedules. And if someone can't do it in person but has to do it telephonically, that's just an extra level of planning that we want to make sure that we've got covered.

And if I can just remind folks, if you're not chatting, please go on mute simply so that we don't have any background noise or anything like that. Thank you.

The last bit of logistical information that someone had asked me about -- and we'll go through the program here bit by bit -- but I want to make sure that I got to it was the whole scheduling issue. And I think there was some confusion within a couple of communities about how this all transpired and came together.

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We have reminded folks when they ask, particularly when they express concern about the proximity of the board workshop in Singapore to this meeting that, you know, wow, gee there's some concerns, there's some potential complications, how can we let this happen. I just wanted to remind everybody that that workshop had already previously been scheduled and I think you all made a good decision in choosing this week to fly the meeting toward the end of the week so that we would be able to have the participation potentially from senior leadership.

And I'm happy to report, as I did in the e-mail, that it looks like we are going to be able to pull that off. As far as Fadi's executive team has been able to tell me, he will be back in Los Angeles on Friday and will be available. We've already blocked his time in the morning. That's obviously subject to travel issues or itineraries and things like that, but it looks like we will have some time with him that day.

David Olive is able to get back from Singapore and the workshop on Thursday evening, so he's hopeful also to be able to make the reception. And he'll certainly be around for conversations on Friday morning as well. So as we get closely to that, I think we will have a little bit more details in terms of people's itineraries and, you know, we might have to be a little bit flexible in terms of the actual timing of things.

I'm hopeful that we can folks for the full timeframe. So we'll continue to work through that. I haven't spoken this week yet with Markus Kummer, but given the fact that it does appear that the board workshop will conclude and things will wrap up in Singapore on Wednesday, I think we're also going to certainly have Markus on Friday. And if he has a similar itinerary to David, we'll also have him for either the afternoon or at least the reception on Thursday night. So I wanted to just close the loop with you all that.

Before I move to the program, are there any other questions, observations, or

concerns about the logistical end of things? Seeing no hands and hearing no

comments, if we can I'd like to turn to the program agenda. Thank you all for

giving me the flexibility to literally pull communities out of the hat to do some

co-chair assignments, and you'll see that as we go through the program.

But I wanted to do another program review with you all just to get a comfort

level that we're close to crystallizing this. Obviously we'll nail it down next

week, if at all possible, to basically say, "Okay we've got our schedule, we

know what our sessions are, we know who the co-chairs are." But I'd just like

to go through the document with you all right now just to make sure that we're

all on the same page literally.

If you're able to put that up, fantastic, Maryam. I did not give you the head's

up that I was going to do this. My apologies. But otherwise you can just, you

know, look through the document as we go through it with what I sent you the

other night.

Looking at meeting one, Thursday February 4, on the schedule we've got an

8:30 gathering window from 8:30 to 9. Susie worked really hard and I was

delighted that -- thanks for getting that up, Maryam -- I was delighted that

Susie was able, through her negotiations with ICANN staff and more

importantly with the hotel, that we were able to get breakfast provided.

And so with an 8 - with a 9 o'clock start, I think that should give most

delegates an opportunity to go down to the restaurant area, be able to have a

leisurely breakfast. Maybe a number of you want to have some one on one or

group conversations. So that time will be available.

We've got this window from 8:30 to 9 just for folks to gather, get their computers open and everything. The arrangements of the hotel are that the restaurant's on the ground level and then the quote, unquote, convention area is just one level up. And so that should give you all and your delegates an opportunity to get an un-stressful start to the day.

I blocked half an hour for the introduction and welcome. David's not going to be in attendance. I'm more than happy to turn over the facilitator or speaking role to anybody. I generally did that introduction for the D.C. meeting and I'm happy to do that again. I have indicated staff meet at E3. That's my team of me, Carlos, Benedetta, and the others who are supporting the meeting.

It may not take the full half hour. We can be flexibility again on timing of things. But, you know, just something to lay out the arc of the meeting, what's going on, the various logistics, giving people an idea about how we're going to run those two days is basically that block of time.

We have our first plenary session, session number one in slot B of the program, indicated there for that 90-minute slot between 9:30 and 11. We've identified that as exploration of common NCPH issues. This was your original brainstorm, Greg, you know, talking about let's start off the meeting with potential areas of commonality and where we may go with that.

I pulled out of my magical hat the BC and the NCUC as potential co-chairs for this session. What I've done is just identify the first person who was involved in the planning for this meeting. So I've identified Phil and Rafik here. Phil and Rafik can assign somebody else to do this or the BC or NCUC can say we want somebody else who's more comfortable doing this.

The BC or NCUC can negotiate and trade this session with anybody. The key here is just this is our original default and you all can play around with who ultimately is going to do it. I would like to nail that down next week, but this is who we have currently in that slot.

Slot C is another 90-minute session that's focused on the processes for community decision-making. Thanks, Greg, for that edit. The co-chairs that I've identified for this session are Lori and Tapani. The reason why Lori is teased out and Cheryl is teased out in here is that you both graciously volunteered and said I'll do anything.

Now that you see where you've been slotted, again, feel free to negotiate or reassign or do anything that you'd like to do within the communities there. But I've identified Lori and Tapani as the co-chairs for that session.

We then moved to lunch which is our Slot D, also blocked for 90 minutes. You'll immediately note right there, gee, (Rob), I don't see a break in the morning.

If we end up being a little bit more efficient in our introductions, from 9:00 to 9:30, that we can program in a 15 minute break or something between the Slot B and Slot C. But right now, it's just, in general, for the framework, (said) those are 90 minutes lots.

We can make them 85 minutes and have a break in between. I think delegates would like to do that so we can be dynamic about that. But for the lunch, we've got this hour and a half slot, and what we talked about last week was the fact that the GNSO future discussion would be best primed by a conversation about GNSO review matters, sort of as an opportunity to set things up.

So we brought in that Slot D, the, quote, unquote, "Informal plenary

discussion on GNSO review matters." I can work with - if you all think it

would make sense to have a member of the staff do a briefing in terms of just

where the status of things are.

I know that the GNSO review team is going to be Meeting Between now and

our meeting so there may be some developments there. If one of you thought

it would be more creative potentially to have the chair of that working group

participate with us remotely, we can arrange for a telephone bridge.

Think about that a little bit. And that something that currently is now assigned

to Cheryl and Rafik as co-chairs. So Cheryl, if you and Rafik want to chat

about that and decide how you want to do that, that's great.

What I anticipate happening is, once we mail this down solidly next week

with assignments, that the co-chairs then have two weeks prior to the meeting

just to connect by email or have a brief phone call.

Even if you just agree, let's get together at 8:30 or 8:00 in the morning to sort

of work on how you want to set up that meeting and how you want to work

through it and arrange it, that's the session that you guys have some

responsibility for.

But for something like, oh, we would like the speaker, please try to let me

know earlier so that Benedetta and I can make the appropriate scheduling

arrangements with staff.

Let me pause there since that concludes the first half of day one and see if

anyone has any comments or questions, concerns or observations about that.

Seeing no hands and hearing nothing, I'll move to the after lunch and through

the evening part of the agenda on day one.

In Slot E, we have plenary session Number 3 scheduled. That's the

aforementioned possible GNSO futures. We've had several conversations

about that on our past planning calls.

Rudi and Tony, you are the co-chairs of that session. I know you've already

had some discussion, I believe, about that. Rafik had offered to help you guys

out on that, so that'll be that session.

It's currently, as you note there, blocked for two hours. Again, we can be

flexible in terms of breaks. If folks need to quickly check emails or something

after lunch, we can start ten minutes later so that those can, you know, run

back to their room, grab a file folder they forgot or something like that.

As we get to the 4:00 time in the afternoon, we scheduled something that

we've had it all the previous - at the two previous meetings - breakout

sessions for you to meet together as a stakeholder group or constituency.

As I mentioned earlier again, this is your time. You basically have that time

between 4:00 pm and literally the 7:00 pm start of the reception downstairs in

the hotel to do whatever you want.

So, you know, that's - if you choose to do it by stakeholder group, fantastic. If

you choose to do it by constituency, that's great, too. Again, we'll be pushing

Maryam and Chantelle for details about that because we want to make sure

that we have coverage.

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This is the time where we've got a little bit of challenge, particularly with

remote participation, to have that staffed to be able to make sure that we've

got that covered.

And so we just need to know those details from you. It also helps to know

whether it's a stakeholder group or constituency because we want to give you

the right sized room.

That's going to be taking place at the hotel so I also want to make sure that

we've got the appropriate technology in the room. So if you need a telephone

bridge, if you need to slide projector the plug the computers into, please let us

know so that we have that set up.

Unlike DC where CSIS had fantastic remote stuff just built into the walls, here

at the hotel, you know, meeting room situations, so we do need to make sure

the stuff is moved in and that they all (go in) those slots. So, again, please let

us know about that.

The reception is planned right now for 2-1/2 hours starting at 7:00, going until

9:30. We can expand that by an extra half-hour if you'd like. My experience

in the past two, is that most folks do sort of melt away 9:30, but there's always

a small core of hard-core folks who are still chatting or talking.

So we can extend that to maybe 10:00 if you think that makes sense. The idea

of this reception is that it's heavy hors d'oeuvres so that, you know, folks can

get all their nutrition and appropriate calories just that the reception.

But with a 9:30 ending and if some folks want to melt away a little bit before

then, that's the opportunity for folks to go out and have a dinner, too, or get

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together in the lounge or someplace else for other conversations and

interactions.

So that's fine. Again, that time is available to cover people. We hope to have

some ICANN staff there and this is also an opportunity for you all to reach out

within the Los Angeles region, for you to invite folks over to join us in the

evening.

The ideal thing about combining your breakout sessions in the afternoon,

within the reception, is conceivably you could do a package where you're

inviting people over basically from 4:00 to 10:00 pm.

So you could have folks over. They visit your meeting. You have whatever

event or discussions and then you blend it into the reception. So, again, we're

trying to give you all the flexibility to make this meeting what you wanted to

be.

Let me stop there as the sun goes down in Los Angeles on day one and see if

anyone else has any comments or questions about day one.

All right, seeing nothing and hearing nothing, let me continue with day two.

Meeting day two starts again similarly - individual breakfasts, gathering and

the half hour time frame. That allows us to make any adjustments.

We find out that, you know, Fadi's plane was delayed. He can't make it. We

have to adjust or do something differently. That's our time to sort of have

those side conversations and the rest.

Again, I set this up because it was very successful when we did here in DC

last year and that was that the roundtables take place with each SG and the

senior staff.

So it's not a full plenary session but each of you have a block of time to work

(out well) to have that 75 minute block with a little break in between so that

each group has its own time period to meet with Fadi and senior staff.

Again, keeping my fingers crossed, I'm very hopeful, and I'm getting

assurances that Fadi will be there. We'll just be flexible with whatever

transpires.

But you might want to prepare the afternoon before - what are we going to

talk about with senior staff? Where the points we want to make? But that

morning period, basically from 9:00 to 11:45, is devoted to that.

Again, what we did in DC that works quite well is, during that time that an SG

was not meeting with senior staff, there was opportunity to meet on their own.

And so that would be, again, an opportunity either for an SG discussion or for

individual constituency discussions for you to talk about matters either that

transpired the day before or to prep for later in the day.

So that block of time is for you all to arrange with Maryam and Chantelle,

your respective secretariats. Again, if you want to have some staff briefings or

things like that, please let Benedetta and I know so that we can reach out to

the appropriate people.

That doesn't mean, by the way, that you all can't reach out to your own - on

your own to folks, but we're here to help liaise in that regard and in that

respect. Lori, your hand is up, so I'll turn the mic over to you. Thanks.

Lori Schulman:

Yes, excuse me. My question is, and it goes back to the day before, but I just thought of it as you were talking now - so we have the breakout sessions at the end of the day, 75 minutes with our constituencies and then this heavy hors d'oeuvres cocktail party.

And I guess I'm confused because we're having our open meetings for our pre-meetings the day before. Is your intention, there, that we invite people to the cocktail on the following day, as well? Is it that open?

Robert Hoggarth: You're welcomed to do that. Again, you know, this innovation of the extra day was something that seemed to work well last time and so that's why the option has been open for you guys to do any programming for any meeting.

> Again, I think the intent there was a recognition that, you know, as an executive team or as leaders of your community, you have read opportunities to get together.

> You're going to be in the same city. We want to give you as many hours of interaction as possible. I don't know. You all have individual personalities is groups and individual cultures as groups.

> So you might want to break up or do your meetings in any way you want to. But, yes, I mean, if you - for example, as Rudi mentioned, NPOC is planning some outreach events

> You might be targeting different types of communities or you might find that some people can meet with you on Wednesday and some people aren't available until Thursday. You have the option, Lori, to do whatever you want in those slots.

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Lori Schulman:

All right, but to the cocktail party question, can we add the cocktail party is an

invite beyond our delegation? That's what I was confused about.

Robert Hoggarth: Yes.

Lori Schulman:

Oh, okay.

((Crosstalk))

Lori Schulman:

So that's just like an added benefit we can let people know about.

Robert Hoggarth: Correct. Yes, if you want to get off the 4:05 on your commute home and, you know, avoid traffic, please drop by and meet with us and learn more about what we're doing or if you want to talk about is that the issue.

> What has generally happened in the past, again, just two meeting experience, we've made arrangements for 75 attendees. And what's worked out, I think, even in DC, where you - I think the number of you had much grander visions about who might show up and I was quite nervous that we were going to end up with 200 people as opposed to 75 or 80, it generally works out that there's about five or six people that you can manage to have come out.

And that's either because of commuting issues or stuff like that. So again, you've got two days to sort of work with this to figure out what works best for the people you're trying to reach out to.

Or maybe it's just, you know, other members of your community who happen to be in the LA area and they benefit from having one of your meetings. You

should look at your individual meetings as something that is related to the intersessional but it doesn't have to be.

This could just be your monthly meeting for this could be an additional meeting that you're having because you've got some specific issues you've got to work out with on the CCWG or the (IANA) transition our work stream two. So, you know, again, please be open and understand that that's your time to do with what you wish.

Lori Schulman:

Yes, I do understand that. I just wasn't clear about the cocktail party itself, and if I had my five extra people or my 15 people from my open meeting whenever I decide to have it as a leader, that I can also extend the hospitality of ICANN to that Thursday cocktail. That's what I was asking clarity about. And it sounds like yes is the answer.

Robert Hoggarth: Yes, and please, please, and you know that, or even as you extend invitations and start to get RSVPs, please, you know, work through Chantelle and Maryam for that so they can tell us because that's what we're going to be doing on Monday and Tuesday as part of the staff prep.

We're going to say, "Okay, are we going to have 75 do we need to feed 125?" And that'll be an important bit of information that we'll need. So if we can just collaborate a bit on that, that would be very helpful. And we just want to make sure that we're on target there.

Lori Schulman: Thank you so much, (Rob). It's very clarifying.

Robert Hoggarth: Great. Thanks for the question. All right, so we've talked about Slot H, Friday morning. We then have, again, a two hour slot here for the lunch. Right now, I mean, I was just blocking this - this is, you know, looking at what the sessions

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were that you all expressed an interest in, and then filling in these final -

basically two slots on Friday afternoon.

I've got a tag as an informal lunch to discuss public meeting matters. And the

BC and NPOC came out of hat for these. So right now, I've got Chris Wilson

and Rudi identified as the named co-chairs for that session.

Again, you guys can reassign this or whatever or take it on yourselves. The

critical aspect to that is, you know, just fine tuning what you want to talk

about there.

I welcome input from anybody on the planning team to provide suggestions to

any co-chairs in terms of where you want and expect this meeting to go.

You'll see, and I'm not going to bore you with the details, the information that

I put together on Pages 5 and 6.

I think that may be more appropriate for written feedback. But I took a stab at

expanding some of the session goals for some of the individual topics. And I'd

ask you all to look at that carefully because those, I hope will provide some

guidance.

Again, just some suggestions right now as to what might be discussed in these

various sessions. But right now we've got that slot for the lunch. I don't know

that you've got two hours of conversation about, you know, talking about

planning for Marrakesh and talking about Meeting B and just generally how

you all want to implement the new meeting strategy, at least as far as from it

NCPH perspective.

But we've got that slot available. And so that's for the lunch period. If, for

some reason, schedules change and that happens to be Fadi's only block or

something like that and we have to shift things around, well, we can keep that in mind.

I hope to have at least a little bit more crystallization and details on that for you all next week. But I think this is - this makes sense from a planning perspective. Rudi, your hand is up so let me turn the mic over to you, sir.

Rudi Vasnick:

Thank you, Robert. Rudi for the transcript. Yes, with regard to the action on the public meeting, Robert, I'm just wondering if it would be good to have some material available from the meeting team with regards to the way they are - and they have already planned the Meeting B which will be in Panama, as - if I'm wrong.

It would be good if we could have a view on where the meetings are going to be scheduled in and how it is going to work together with the other sessions. I know that some drafting has already been done but it would be great if we could have some more finalized off for that session.

Robert Hoggarth: Great. Than- those are good comments. Thanks very much, Rudi. I will do that. I'll reach out to Nick Tomasso. I think at that time he'll be in a good position.

There may be actually a discussion taking place between now and the Meeting Between him of the SOAC leaders and staff because I know that ccNSO, GNSO and others have had some separate multilateral conversations about Meeting B that have also, I think, bled it to just general discussions about the new meeting strategy.

So I could foresee there, for you guys, a short briefing at the beginning of the lunch from staff to give you all the sense as to where things stand. David

Oliver is going to be there and basically he's the senior staff leader form

Meeting B. Since the focus of that meeting is policy development, he's taken

on the responsibility, accountability and laboring (over) for his team to sort of

work through and plan and discuss what Meeting B would look like.

So I think we'll have the right people around to have that conversation. And

then you and (Chris) could talk about, yes, then just how to facilitate the

conversations in the feedback there. Thanks for that suggestion.

And then I saved the most exciting for last, and again, you all should talk a

little bit about what topics you would like to explore here, but this is, again,

your brainstorm, Greg, with respect to have a session that talks about third rail

issues. Benedetta, is that question about this topic or did you want to talk

quickly about the public meeting matters item?

Benedetta Rossi: About the public meeting matter, just flagging Greg's comment on the AC

chat about potentially having someone from the (meetings) team come to the

meeting to discuss Meeting B.

I don't know if that is in line with what you mentioned about David, but I

don't know if the meetings team might have specific session breakdown that

may be interesting to the community.

Robert Hoggarth: Yes, great. Thanks. I'll incorporate that in my request when I reach out to

Nick, because I think - I mean, I don't know that there will be much more

substantive discussions between now and the meeting at the SOAC leader

level.

But if there is, it would certainly be a great opportunity to talk about that. I don't think that there at the level of granularity yet about specific block schedule.

But that's certainly something that would be important for us to learn. So, yes, I'll definitely incorporate that into the request. Thanks, Greg and Tapani and Rudi and Cheryl for your reinforcement of that. I'll definitely do that.

So yes, on the third rail side, at least the way that I brainstormed this a bit, Greg and Tapani, was that it's an opportunity for each of the SGs, basically to share an issue or two, and so these are really important ones and we know that, you know, this is a major issue for you.

Greg, your hand is up, so let me hear sort of your concept or idea about the scheduling of that, when it is, with you'd like to move that around or how you might handle that session. Greg, you have the floor.

Greg Shatan:

Thank you. Greg here. I think first, I just want to mention that, you know, among the IPC, we've started putting together kind of the scratch draft list of topics for the third rail.

They also have - I realize that the third rail is a very New York centric expression. So just in case not everybody else understand that, the third rail is the real alongside the two New York subway rails for the train goes.

The third rail has all the electricity on it. And if you touched the third rail, you get fried. So people tend to avoid touching the third rail for that reason. So we do have a list and I need to go back this time to our group just to kind of double check it and then we can circulate that around for some broader consideration.

You know, other than that in terms of, you know, taking the time, I think, you

know, we need to pick a - just a limited number of topics and try to see, you

know, we can do with them.

And I think, you know, the idea - my idea is try to see if we can transcend

some of the, you know, positions and diversity of the positions to see if we

can find some common positions among the third rail issues.

And, you know, at least try to narrow them somewhat. And, you know, or at

the least, we'll, you know, have a greater understanding of each other's

positions on these issues. Thanks.

Robert Hoggarth: Thanks very much, Greg. Does anyone have any reactions or comments to

Greg's ideas there? That's great, Greg. This is (Rob) again. Thanks very much

because I think that, having that list circulated would be a value particularly

for preparations.

You know, again, part of the breakout sessions in preparing for other parts of

the meeting would allow different groups to talk about this a little bit. And,

you know, Tapani, you all might have a similar list or have a conversation in

that regard in terms of what you might want to share as well. So that's a good

approach, Greg. Thank you for that.

The final slot here, Slot K, is plenary session number five. Tony Holmes and

Rafik but the magic ticket as this popped out. This is generally the wrap up

session which gives you on opportunity to reinvestigate some of the issues

that you had talked about before which allows you to maybe expand the

conversation, revisit something.

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Maybe you had a subgroup that said, "We're going to get together on

Thursday night and talk about putting together a draft our something that

people can react to the next day."

So this is really a slot to allow that to happen. And, Tony and Rafik, you're in

the role there of facilitating those discussions. Either you guys take it or, (Jen),

you take it over from Tony or however you guys want to work that out.

Now, I think the challenges this presents to me, and the only other last

logistical item that I wanted to raise that we had sort of left to the sidelines,

and I know I bring this up from time to time just because I want to get a

resolution to it, is the concept of a communiqué.

And what happened in DC, if I recall correctly, is that you used this session as

sort of the wrap up of the communiqué document to do some final

wordsmithing and conversations about it as part of that final session.

Now, no one has really stepped up and said, "Yes, we are going to do the

communiqué. That was great. And we have a huge issue that we want to talk

about this time."

It really sort of came together organically at the meeting in DC. That may be

for you all want to leave it. And so you can just - you know, this last session

essentially is something that's relatively open, that has some planned

flexibility and you all can chat about sort of where you are after the first day.

Tony and Rafik they want to look at that and say, "Hmm, here's some idea for

what we have might be the right agenda item for the (unintelligible)." That's

also an opportunity to explore, you know, anything else that might have, what

we didn't have on the agenda and that we could plug into the agenda (at that

time).

Somebody came off mute so I don't know if anyone else has a, they'd like to

make. I'll wait a moment. I know, Maryam, that Rafik lost audio, that you've

noted in the chat.

Thank you whoever went back on mute. And then just finally, Slide L, that

was - I have an identified any particular chair role there but that's essentially

the closing and next steps discussion.

Throughout the course of the meeting from a staff perspective, obviously we

will be taking active notes. This will be an opportunity perhaps for us to

summarize what we've noted down.

It's a good practice that we do that, of course, within each session to sort of

capture, okay, what are we going to do with this item? What's the next step?

Is there a follow-up that's necessary?

But this final Slot L, just a half hour block -- excuse me -- at this point, is an

opportunity for us to capture those and figure out sort of what the next steps

are on some particular items.

I will share that we will similarly do what we did at the end of the DC

meeting, much more quicker this time, if go out to the delegates with an

evaluation form, of feedback opportunity for you and your delegates to give

us feedback about what might change for the next meeting.

That's the full sort of walk-through of the agenda. And I'll throw it out the last

time here to see if anyone has any comments about any aspect of the today's,

anything else that you would like to add or any questions as we sort of wrap

up here.

I see no hands and I don't hear anything. I know that Greg's typing there. So I

would like to, with all of your consensus, keep our call on for next week at the

same time.

Given the fact of our exhaustive review of the agenda here, I don't know that

it's a call that's going to take the full hour simply because it seems like we

have some really good consensus here.

So he may be able to use next week just to confirm with the co-chairs are, for

me to give you fee- you know, last-minute or at least the latest on logistics.

And we can address any other issues that may come up from a programming

standpoint.

It probably won't take the full 60 minutes. I'm looking at your comment real

briefly here, Greg, that we may want to raise and discuss next week

moderators beyond this group if need be.

That's possible. I mean, from a staff perspective, we're happy to take on that

role to the extent that you think we're capable of doing that. I think it worked

pretty well last time and the feedback on the surveys seem to reflect that.

But, if we do have recommendations or suggestions from folks who might

locally be in the LA area who can help us out, please let me know, and that

something that we can factor into at least considering.

So please, Greg, if you wanted to follow up on that or if anyone has some

thoughts about that or some ideas, please let me know. All right, well, thank

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you all very much. I'm looking to see any final hands, pausing just

momentarily to hear if there are any audio or verbal final interventions.

And hearing none, thank you all very much. I'm sorry that I talked so much,

but appreciate you with the chat comments and the other interventions.

Thanks for the applause, Rudi. And we look forward to doing a final touch

base with you all next week. Thanks very much for the emails.

Please keep them coming. I don't anticipate the need to do a 7.1 in terms of

substantive changes but I will do one to sort of scrub off the edits and the red

lines and stuff like that and I'll look for any other typos. Thank you all very

much. We'll talk to you next week and see you online. Bye-bye now.
