DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

I think we can start the recording and do the roll call. Persons can come in when they can.

SPEAKER:

Sure. This is [Esham] speaking. Shall we please start the recording? Good morning, good afternoon and good evening to everyone, and welcome to today's ALS Sub Committee on Outreach and Engagement call, taking place on Tuesday, 19th of January 2016 at 18:00 UTC. On today's call we have Daniel Nanghaka, Tijani Ben Jemaa, Siranush Vardanyan, Maureen Hilyard, [unclear], [unclear 01:01], Alan Greenberg, Wolf Ludwig, Glenn McKnight, Jeff Dunn and Dennis [Lance].

We have apologies from Alfredo Calderon, Aris Ignacio, and from staff we have Heidi Ullrich, Gisella Gruber, and myself [unclear]. I'd like to remind everyone to state their names while speaking, not only for transcript purposes, but also for interpretation purposes as well. Over to you, Dev. Thank you.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

A very good afternoon. Good morning, good afternoon, good evening to everyone. It's now nine minutes past the hour, so apologies for the late start, but we do have important topics to discuss regarding the possible outreach events for the ICANN 55 Meeting in Marrakech. Just to note something regarding the roll call — I just got a text from Jacqueline Morris, sending her apologies, as she teaches right now. Just note that in the roll call.

Note: The following is the output resulting from transcribing an audio file into a word/text document. Although the transcription is largely accurate, in some cases may be incomplete or inaccurate due to inaudible passages and grammatical corrections. It is posted as an aid to the original audio file, but should not be treated as an authoritative record.

On the Thursday call we exchanged some ideas for what we could do for At-Large outreach in Marrakech. A Tuesday slot was identified, from 14:00 to 16:00, and a bus was made available. Among the things we discussed, we discussed two possibilities — having university students come into the venue, and the second option was a sub group going out to the local university, which would have been ten minutes away. Aziz could probably speak more to this. Aziz had contacted some university students in Rabat, which is about a four-hour drive from Marrakech, if I understand correctly.

So one of the challenges would be how we could get those students to the ICANN venue, and back. One of the options to do that in mind – and I put this all on the AFRALO Outreach Event workspace – was that if the possibility is there, to bring the students to attend the Sunday and Monday session. The reason why is because the Sunday and Monday sessions are geared for the Newcomers, as opposed to coming midmeeting on a Tuesday, which is not optimal compared to having the Newcomers come in on the Sunday and Monday and experiencing the meeting sessions on those two days.

The question is, is that possible? We have people from ICANN GSE staff, Yaovi Atohoun, and some other ICANN staff members, who could probably give some answers to that possibility. With that in mind, I think I've summarized the key ideas there on what we discussed on Thursday, and what we'll do now today. Let's discuss the option of whether it's possible to have students attend the Sunday and Monday sessions.

We have two sets of students – the students of the University of Rabat, which is a four-hour drive away from Marrakech, so that would mean such a group of students coming from Rabat would need some hotel accommodation for the Sunday and Monday... Well, for Saturday, Sunday, and probably leave Monday evening. And then having the local university students having some sort of transport where they could come in on the Sunday and come in on the Monday. Aziz, I hope I've summarized the key options there.

Hearing no questions or comments, let me ask Yaovi – Yaovi, I know you and Aziz have been working on the local outreach. Can you give us an idea of what GSE is planning or able to do in terms of accommodating students for Sunday and Monday?

YAOVI ATOHOUN:

Baher sends his apologies. I think what he concluded, because GSE is very committed to support your activity in Marrakech, there are some commitments from the GSE Team, and Baher and our team is going to support some students. There was some discussion between Baher and Heidi, and I think Heidi can also talk on this. Heidi, if you don't mind?

HEIDI ULLRICH:

Thank you Yaovi. I did have a chance to speak with Baher here in Istanbul about this. I believe what we've tentatively agreed is the GSE Team there could cover the accommodation for the University of Rabat students, on a couple of conditions, which I believe Aziz has been informed about and is in agreement with. First, the students would need to share the hotel rooms. The hotels would be in town, so they

would be a very reasonable rate, and thirdly, Aziz would need to do the

arranging of the hotel.

Those are some of the requests from our end. While I have the floor, I'd like to mention that if possible, if we could include the 60-70 University of Rabat students in all of the outreach activities being planned – and that would be for two days, by the way, Monday and Tuesday, two days and one night - and we're very much hoping these students would be coming and being very active at the amazing AFRALO Showcase and Fadi farewell being planned for Monday evening, and then also begin their day early on Tuesday with a sector standup that Janice, who's also on

the call, is going to be organizing.

I'll hand the floor over to her in a minute. Also, we'd have these University of Rabat students join ICANN Meetings on the Tuesday, join the outreach activities that this group is planning at a local university in Marrakech, and then also perhaps, if at all possible, join the NextGen activities that might be going on on Monday and Tuesday. We have Jeff Dunn, who leads that, who I would also hope might be able to speak. Those are some ideas. I think there's a lot of fantastic thiking of events here, where we could do a lot of really useful and exciting collaboration between all of these activities that ICANN and you are developing.

Dev, if you permit me, if I could hand the floor over to Janice and then

Jeff to comment on these issues?

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH: Go right ahead, Janice.

HEIDI ULLRICH:

I think Janice might not have audio. Jeff, if you wanted to comment on that?

JEFF DUNN:

Yes. I was just getting a message from Janice saying she's calling in, wasn't on the line, but was listening to what you were saying. She'll probably be able to weigh in after me, but I wanted to say for the Development and Public Responsibility Department, this is really exciting and worth doing all of this outreach and engagement, and it's really cool, and we'd be really happy to assist with some of the logistics, but unfortunately we don't have budget to allocate for this. So I'm [unclear 12:48] GSE folks and see what they can do in terms of making sure the logistical support is able to be done.

What DPRD and NextGen and Fellowship and everybody can do is do introductions and meet with some of these students at some point. They can all get together and we can really develop a community on the ground there. But in terms of integrating them for the programs, that's a little bit of a more difficult thing, since each program is obviously its own bespoke event, and NextGen is something that's been set up for about 30 students that are coming, and adding in another 60 or 70 is just not feasible.

But we can definitely do a meet-up or a social event or something like that, which would be terrific. That's our perspective right now. We really want to be able to help this along as much as possible, but obviously we have a lot of other programs we're working with as well, so

we'll figure out the best possible way to fit all these programs into this outreach.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Thanks Jeff. Janice, do you want to come on? I'm seeing she can't get the Adigo line. Okay, can somebody dial out to Janice?

HEIDI ULLRICH:

I'm going to go out on a limb. I should have read her email more closely, but my understanding of the sector standup – and just help me here if you can – is that the sector standup is something the Fellows have been doing for the last two meetings or so, and it's a very new and exiting way for the ICANN community to reach out to the Fellows. This time it will be on Tuesday morning. What they do, the Fellows are divided into the groups they identify with – so end users, academics, business, government, et cetera, and then those community members who wish to go to that sector standup to speak to these Fellows are able to do that.

So the point here being that these University of Rabat students might wish to attend that sector standup and divide into the group that they feel comfortable with during that event. I do want to point out that, as [Tamika] noted in the chat, it depends on the availability in the room. There might need to be some sign-up sheet or limitation to where we don't overcrowd people. Thank you Dev.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

There's lots of information to process here. It's possible that 60-70 students can be accommodated at a nearby hotel, the idea being for Monday and Tuesday. Also the opportunity for NextGen, they can offer a meet-up with the students, and also they can take part in the sector standup that the Fellows do, where the Fellows group themselves according to interest.

JANICE DOUMA-LANGE:

Hi Dev. Thank you Heidi for the overview of the sector standup, and [Tamika], certainly, [unclear 16:49] just having gotten all the session requests, whether the room is available or not for this activity, we certainly hope that it can be. The one clarification I will make is that I do have alumni at the Fellowship Program who assist with the sector standup base don their experience, and also because it's part of the give-back of the Alumni Program, an important thing to mention to all of our community members is that once someone goes to the Fellowship Program there are expectations of them when they return.

So based on their experience level they can either volunteer at the ICANN Information Booth, and/or do coaching for new Fellows, and/or work with the sector standup, but they would be working alongside experienced staff and community members in order to do that. We do always want to make sure that we have someone like Heidi, Gisella, Jean-Jacques, Nigel, Christopher Mondini, who are representing from the sector as well. Hopefully we would be able to get that.

Of course, the Newcomer Day on Sunday is available to everyone and open. We're going to do some updates to that, including the DNSSEC for

Beginners. It will be added to the end of the Sunday Newcomer, instead of on Monday. So that will be very exciting for everyone – morning meetings Monday through Thursday are open as well. They're open to the public.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Thanks Janice. I do have questions, but I see there's a queue already. Aziz?

AZIZ HILALI:

Thank you Dev. I just wanted to let you know that we're going to invite students from Rabat and Marrakech, as you said, and then I heard someone say whether the students joining us from Rabat are going to arrive in Marrakech on Sunday evening or on Monday morning. Well, there's a meeting that's going to take place at the university, which means that they had to go home from Marrakech to Rabat in the evening. So I wanted to answer that question I was asked first.

Then I also wanted to know what the budget that is going to be dedicated to the organization of all these activities is? I personally started to work on the list of participants, and so I think we should try and join efforts so as not to double the work. There's a list that we've been putting together for communications persons and journalists we'll be inviting to cover all these activities. I think it might be useful to invite all these journalists who work on communications and telecommunications, especially.

Some of them might be working with the universities, so it would be a good opportunity to put them in touch and have them all together with us in Marrakech at once. I wanted to say that we are very grateful and very interesting in seeing what the training is that will be taking place on Tuesday evening. Thank you.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Thanks Aziz. I think we're having some genesis of an idea here. We're going to have university students come in, and according to Yaovi there is support for some... And I guess we have to focus on the numbers afterwards, but there's support for some university students to come from Rabat and stay at a nearby hotel and be able to then attend two days of sessions at the ICANN Meeting. My question — and I see [Tamsin] has raised a point — is how many persons can really attend. Is there an upper limit to what would be the number of students that could attend the two days?

The second part of this is we're talking about the Rabat students, and that's good, but we also have to include the local university students. There is a local university ten minutes away. What could happen is they don't need a hotel, but perhaps there's transport at the beginning of each of those two days? Okay? Aziz?

AZIZ HILALI:

Regarding the number of participants, I think there's going to be about 100 people all in all, between university students and journalists, so between 60-70 students and then 30 journalists specialized in telecommunications. That's roughly what I think we might have. I'm

trying to put together the list as we speak. Now, regarding our discussions with ICANN staff, we're trying to find an alternative hotel – not to have them stay at the ICANN official hotel, because they're too expensive.

We're trying to find a cheaper hotel so they can stay downtown and have more people come over. If we reduce that budget, we can... We've already arranged to have transportation for them to come to the venue very day from the hotel. We've also been working on travel arrangements for them to get from Rabat to Marrakech, and a bus to get them to the university has already been arranged as well. The question remaining here is how many nights they can stay. Is it only Monday night, or only Sunday night or Tuesday night? That's what I'd like to know.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

I think the intent is for two days and one night. Heidi or Yaovi can answer that question.

HEIDI ULLRICH:

I think to get the outreach impact, it would make sense to me that they arrive on Monday morning, if they're really early risers, I don't know. They might not make the welcome ceremony. Then they could attend the high-interest topics during the day on Monday, the big event on Monday night, the AFRALO Showcase and Fadi farewell. Then on Tuesday morning they can do all the events that are focused on outreach; so again the sector standup, a few of them, then if they could,

perhaps some type of collaboration with the NextGen. That would need some planning there.

Then indeed they could join the shuttle bus going to the local university later that day. On the shuttle bus, we have one bus, so if there are 80 people then we'd need to have that bus do two trips. Aziz, if you could write or state the name of the university that these events are going to take place at, that would be very useful for staff to know. Thank you.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Aziz, can you respond to that? Okay. I think the challenge here is documenting all of this. Heidi, you mentioned you're thinking it's optimal for students to come on the Monday. My question to you is, as Janice pointed out, there are a lot of Newcomer sessions on the Sunday. Wouldn't it make more sense to have them come on the Sunday? That would be my question.

HEIDI ULLRICH:

I'm really budget conscious, because I've given an approximate number to Baher, which I agreed, so I need to stay within that budget. It might be that 30 of them come on Sunday/Monday, and then the other 30 or so come on Monday/Tuesday. It's one night. If they come on Sunday then they would do Sunday night and they'd need to leave Monday, and they'd then miss all of the outreach events, which was the main reason for bringing them, which are on Tuesday. The option would be to split them, but that would mean double the transportation cost.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Okay. I just want to make sure everybody's understood all of this. So we're going to try and bring in the students early Monday, so they can take part in most of the Monday events, and therefore spend Monday night at a nearby hotel, and then come in on the Tuesday to be included in the Tuesday activities, including possibly the one that we would therefore be doing on the Tuesday afternoon. They've got the standup in the morning, the At-Large outreach event happening on the Tuesday afternoon.

I'm thinking this is probably better... It probably doesn't make sense, as was discussed last week, to go out to the local university... The Outreach and Event Group will be doing the At-Large event in the afternoon. I'm thinking it's probably better to have it at the venue itself, rather than having a whole group go out to a local university – in other words have option one back in the afternoon, given we're having University of Rabat students and local university students attending the venue. It doesn't make sense to leave the venue to go out somewhere else. It's better to have the session in the afternoon there. Aziz?

AZIZ HILALI:

Thank you Dev. I'd like to say that I was cut off. I was speaking and I was cut out. I said that on Monday morning during the Opening Ceremony, I don't know if you know Morocco, but we need the students to leave some hour before. So if you want the students to be at the Opening Ceremony in the morning, they have to arrive on Sunday night. If you took the decision that they will only spend one night, we won't be able to ask them to participate in the activities on Monday.

They'd be able to participate only in the Showcase activities, and then in Tuesday's activities. That's all they'd be able to do. If the students have to leave at 3:00 AM to be there on Monday morning, this is something I can't guarantee. I'm finished.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Thanks for that Aziz. I guess it's really up to Yaovi or Heidi to answer that, because what Aziz is raising is that the challenge for the Rabat students to come early on Monday would be quite a huge challenge. You're talking about leaving early morning, 3:00 or 4:00, to reach the ICANN venue for Monday. Any response for that Heidi?

HEIDI ULLRICH:

Again, I think we all need to be flexible. If they miss the Welcome Ceremony, there's always a link to it, they can watch it on their own. I think the main reason it was agreed to bring these students was really to participate in At-Large activities. By bringing them in Monday they could do the AFRALO Showcase and the Fadi farewell on Monday, and then do all of the exciting events on Tuesday that are being planned for the outreach.

In terms of missing the Newcomer Event on Sunday, it was agreed last week that we'd be providing them with their homework, as students should do. They could view a lot of the material using the ICANNLearn courses, or we can provide them with USBs to learn more about ICANN. Thank you.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Thanks Heidi. That does make sense. I think we have the general gist of the idea. Having the students coming in Monday, it could be midmorning Monday, and then they'd be able to take part in some of the sessions on Monday. Then on Tuesday they can take part in the sector standup, and our At-Large outreach events in the afternoon. This brings us back to the focus of what exactly we want to do for the Tuesday. This is more the work of the Outreach and Engagement Sub Committee. We did discuss the two options. We discussed the two options in isolation with the University of Rabat students coming. I want to look at that option again.

I still think if we have University of Rabat students there, it's probably better to bring the local university students, make sure they pre-register well beforehand, so that they would be cleared to attend the venue, and then we have the sessions similar to how the option one was documented on the workspace. We have a one-hour session with interpretation, talking a little more about the At-Large, and then walk around to see some of the other [unclear 35:25] sessions, and then come back for a follow-up discussion of what they've seen, and ask any questions.

Then all the students can leave on the Tuesday evening; both the local university students, and the University of Rabat students. What do people think of this idea for doing it on Tuesday? In my mind it didn't make sense to have University of Rabat students at the venue and then go back out to an external venue again. I want to get some thoughts from the Outreach and Engagement Sub Committee as to ideas on this. Any comments or questions, or is there general agreement to what we're going to do on Tuesday?

I take it that we're okay with this plan for Tuesday – a group of At-Large and Outreach will have a session at the ICANN venue, in a room with interpretation, to talk about At-Large. Then the second hour we can split up into groups, pair them with a speaker, and walk around the venue to the various communities that are meeting at the ICANN Meeting during that time. Then in the third hour they can come back and ask any more follow up questions and so forth. Then afterwards, all the students can leave. Is that okay? Tijani?

TIJANI BEN JEMAA:

If I understood well, the whole afternoon of Tuesday will not be in the university facility. Is that right? Or have I misunderstood?

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Thanks. What I'm suggesting is that given that we have the University of Rabat students already here, and I'm not sure when the NextGen activities are happening on the Tuesday afternoon... Early Tuesday afternoon we could have the meeting with the NextGen, but because we have the University of Rabat students at the venue already, it doesn't make sense to go outside to a local university.

My suggestion is to ensure that the local university students are also pre-registered and have their identification papers in hand and whatnot, to come to the venue on Monday and also come on Tuesday. Then both groups of students can then meet with the Outreach and Engagement, and At-Large, to talk about At-Large and so forth.

TIJANI BEN JEMAA:

Okay. To follow up, I have seen that [Tanzanika] has said that it is perhaps not possible to have the external students at the venue, because it is a problem of size of rooms. Also, another point. In my point of view, we have the NextGen at hand, and we may make outreach for them at any time we want, and at any time we may agree with them and with Jeff's team. They are guaranteed, and they are there. We have people that Aziz will bring from Rabat, and those people will be with us inside the venue and then will go with us to the university. Those people don't make any problem.

I think that we may make a lot of sessions of outreach, and I think that three or three and a half hours in the university will be very good, for us and for them. For us, it's training, because we'll have to have outreach days during Meeting B, so we need to be trained. We need to go outside and see how we may do that. We will also do the outreach for the NextGen. As I said, they're with us in the venue, so it's not a problem for us.

I think we have to make use of this opportunity go to the university, to spend the whole afternoon, three of three and a half hours in the university. Aziz will arrange even for a coffee break, because three and a half hours is too long, and our duty, in my point of view, is to make a very good program for it. It means that we need to define very well the topics that we'll address with those people in the university, and we need to have the final team, who will introduce those topics and then give the floor to them so that they ask questions and interact with those panelists. It will be, in my point of view, a very good experience. We have to do it so we'll be trained for Meeting B. Thank you.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Thanks Tijani. I'm just raising it as a suggestion, but if you think it's better to go to the local university, which is ten minutes away, like I said, if that's what the group does then let's do that. I was just raising it as a possibility. Okay, then let's continue with the original idea then, which s we'll have a sub group of speakers, along with a group of persons from NextGen, et cetera, go out to this university on the Tuesday afternoon, carrying their outreach materials, et cetera, and then come back.

We'll leave the Tuesday as originally planned, unless somebody objects to that. Aziz, maybe he has something to say about it. Go ahead.

AZIZ HILALI:

Thank you Dev. I just wanted to say that I support what Tijani said. It's very interesting for us, for the ICANN people, to go out of the ICANN venue to go to the university, to meet the students, to be among academic people. It is the idea of this activity. If we ask students to come to the venue it won't be so interesting. Regarding the capacity building, I think Tijani already said on the phone that we need to have some French-speaking panelists, but those are university students. They have a good liver.

I will ask my Rabat students to ask questions in English, so we can have three ALAC persons speaking French, and two speaking English. Those five persons who come will be the panel and we will work in the university, and among this panel we'll try to do short speeches to give the students some time to intervene.

We want an interactive session so those students will receive a lot of information about what they need so we can give five or eight minutes per person to intervene, and we can have 30 or 50 minutes' intervention for the panel, and then each student will have the floor. So we'll have some inter-activity. The panelists will also be able to answer regarding the questions, and the questions will be asked to some people from the panel. So this is my proposal. I'd like to have your opinion on this proposal Dev. Thank you.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Yes, it's pretty much in line with what was discussed on the Thursday. I think generally that was the idea. Anybody with thoughts or comments on this?

HEIDI ULLRICH:

I just want to say two things. Just a reminder that we set up a space for all the information related to the Outreach Day on Tuesday, so people could start developing the agenda there. On the same workspace we've put a space where you can start listing the materials you believe would be very useful for these university students – both those from Rabat as well as from Marrakech – to have available for them. We could put that on a USB drive.

The second point is that if we do miss the connection or the collaboration with the NextGen students, what we might be able to have arranged is for Fadi to do a meet and greet with the university students coming from the University of Rabat. I know one of the activities Fadi will be doing after leaving ICANN is teaching at Harvard. I know that he

has a passion for teaching and interacting with university students. So that might be something that you wish to consider. Thank you.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Thanks for this Heidi. Indeed, that's possibly a fill-in option for when the group goes to the local university; for the Rabat students there at the venue to perhaps have an interaction with Fadi and a meet and greet with Fadi during that time. My question to the group: is there any opportunities for civil society engagement? We've talked university students. But Aziz, I guess you can answer this question: are there any types of civil society groups, any outreach opportunities, for civil society groups that we can consider? Tijani? Go ahead.

TIJANI BEN JEMAA:

Yes, we may, because we will bring five NGOs to the Meeting. We may prepare a program for them, an outreach program for them. As AFRALO we already have a program for them, a full program. We will do capacity building for them, a daily session, and we have other activities with them. But if you want, we may include all this and work together to make a program that's richer and more consistent.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH: Very well. Heidi, I see you have a response? Go ahead.

HEIDI ULLRICH:

Dev, it's not really a response, just a note to let you know that I've been in touch with groups of staff who are working on civil society

engagement. I am aware that ICANN communities and constituencies – the NCSG, NCUC – are planning some civil society events in Marrakech. As for the local activities, I think that that is still being discussed, but there might be some opportunity for some kind of collaboration with existing activities. Thank you Dev.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

I think next steps for this, since it's coming to the top of the hour — I know we started late, but I'm also mindful that we have interpreters on this call, so I don't want to go on too long after this — but I think we now have a general sense of where we want to go for this. My concern is that I think we need to lock down the details and document all of this properly. Might I suggest that the AFRALO Outreach Events Workspace... I'd suggest that Daniel, the Co Chair of Outreach and Engagement, would work alongside Aziz and Tijani in documenting what's going to happen in terms of students coming on Monday.

I think what we want to do is set up a timeline of what's happening. If the students are coming Monday, what are the opportunities available to them, and then what are the opportunities available to the Rabat students on Tuesday, and then also work up the timeline for our outreach event to the local university that's happening Tuesday afternoon between 14:00 and 18:00. I think it's really important we need to document this, because otherwise the details will fall through the cracks on this.

I'm sure staff are also making key inputs onto this. I'm just saying we need to document it properly. What we then have to do is make sure

that once we have that schedule we can make sure that... I think the persons coming from the University of Rabat have already been selected, and I don't know if they have to do any registration process and so on, but we need to get that schedule locked down and then find out... [Tanzima's] concern is whether there is enough space for them to go to the different places that we want the students to go to – those types of things. Once we have numbers and so forth...

I think that's going to be the next Action Item. Let's detail the schedule of this on the AFRALO Event Workspace. Daniel, staff, Aziz, Tijani would work to document that. My next question would be when should we have another call on this? Should there be a weekly call, a sub-call, to coordinate issues and so forth? If so, when? That would be my question. Do you want to do it every Tuesday?

I do think you need to have some weekly meetings, at least for now, because you need to lock down all these details and organize it. What time would be appropriate for this type of outreach, for the Marrakech outreach? Any suggestions from staff or Gisella on this? Or do we need to do a Doodle and find another appropriate time or day of the week to do it? Heidi?

HEIDI ULLRICH:

I think we can probably do a Doodle. Dev, the reason being is there needs to be a lot of staff, and in discussion with Aziz, and Daniel and Tijani on this, and then between the various groups working on this. I think we need a little bit of time, and then we can get back to you with a schedule on many more details.

DEV ANAND TEELUCKSINGH:

Okay. Maybe the thing would be to start a Skype chat or something like that, or an email thread, with Daniel, Aziz, Tijani, and the relevant staff persons; Yaovi as well perhaps, all the relevant persons, and coordinate this. Maybe then this sub group can decide on what time it wants to meet and have a Doodle amongst itself. Would that be okay? I don't see any problem with that idea. Okay. Any other thoughts, comments, questions, observations? I'd like to thank everybody for attending this call.

A lot of progress made in trying to understand what are the opportunities available and how we're going to take advantage of those opportunities. We look forward to the sub group taking this and moving forward with these opportunities for Marrakech. Perhaps what we can do, as part of the regular Outreach and Engagement activity, is look at the Tuesday planning in terms of materials we need printed or translated and so forth – those types of materials that we need for the Tuesday sessions.

But perhaps what's happening Monday, the sub group will be able to handle that, with Daniel, Aziz, Tijani, and staff. Okay? I'd like to thank everyone again for attending this call. Have a very good afternoon, good evening, good night. This call is now adjourned. Thank you all.
