What is the New gTLD Program?

- An initiative to enable the introduction of generic top-level domain names (including IDNs)
- Intended to realize full benefits of growing Internet
- Intended to facilitate competition, choice for Internet users and innovation
- Encourage participation of communities
 - Geographic
 - Language
 - Cultural

ICANN's Mission and New gTLDs


1998 - founding documents

"The new corporation ultimately should ... oversee policy for determining the circumstances under which new TLDs are added to the root system"

ICANN Memoranda of Understanding

"Define and implement a predictable strategy for selecting new TLDs"

New gTLD Policy Development

- 21-month intensive, bottom-up effort by ICANN's volunteer policy development body, including testing "implementability"
 - Face-to-face meetings
 - Numerous public comment periods
- Informed by several independent working groups
 - IDN
 - Reserved names
 - Protection of rights
- Informed by ICANN's Advisory Committees
 - Governmental Advisory Committee Principles on New gTLDs
 - The At-Large community
 - Security and Stability Advisory Committee

Policy Conclusions

- New gTLDs will provide benefit:
 - Broaden DNS participation
 - Increased choice, competition
- Include IDNs
- New gTLDs should not cause security or stability issues
- Allocation method and selection criteria guidance
 - Limited by rounds
 - Not limited by category
- Certain important issues should be protected

Interests to be Protected in the Process

- Intellectual property rights
- Community interests
- Limited public interest safeguards: sensitive names
- User confusion should be avoided
- Interests of governments


Policy Implementation: Applicant Guidebook

- Iteration with ICANN community
- Seven complete versions of Guidebook
- 47 comment periods over 2400 comments / analyses
- 55 Explanatory memoranda / Independent reports
 - Economic studies
 - Consultation with SSAC / RSAC / Root Server Operators
- Development of dispute resolution processes
- Rights protection mechanisms and malicious conduct mitigation measures

Conclusion

New gTLD Program was developed and designed to open the namespace in a way that:

- Assured ongoing <u>stability and security</u> of the DNS
- Protected the legal rights of others
- <u>Promoted competition and choice</u> for users
- Engendered global stakeholder participation in the Internet



New gTLD Program Timeline




First new gTLD Delegation: 23 October 2013

Review Dimensions

1

Efficiency

To what extent resources (time, effort, cost) were well used for the intended purpose.



Predictability

To what extent the Program process/procedures/timelines provided predictability.

2

Effectiveness

To what degree the process was successful in producing desired results/achieving objectives.



Security and Stability

StabilityTo what extent the process/procedure/framework supported security and stability of the DNS.

3

Fairness

To what extent decision-making was consistent, objective, and adhered to documented policies and procedures.



Alignment to Policy and implementation Guidelines

To what extent the Program execution adhered to GNSO policy recommendations and AGB.



Lessons Learned and Public Comments

- Lessons learned are intended as considerations for future rounds of the New gTLD Program
 - 49 lessons learned identified in the report
- Public comment period from September 2015 December 2015
