Jason Hynds: (11:38) There is quite a difference in the "welcome" within the Fellowship vs the At-Large. Fellowship is a family. In my opinion, At-Large is a vast desert with perhaps few oases and the risk of damage from the weather and other marauding attacks. I can't say that I have experienced an easy road with it outside of the face-to-face meeting structure (in which case people are always awesome). I would guess this may be more a norm than an exception. RALOs need to address their orientation and ongoing mentoring strategies! Sometimes I just cannot introduce new participants to the RALO structure as it is not an easy enough on-boarding experience.
