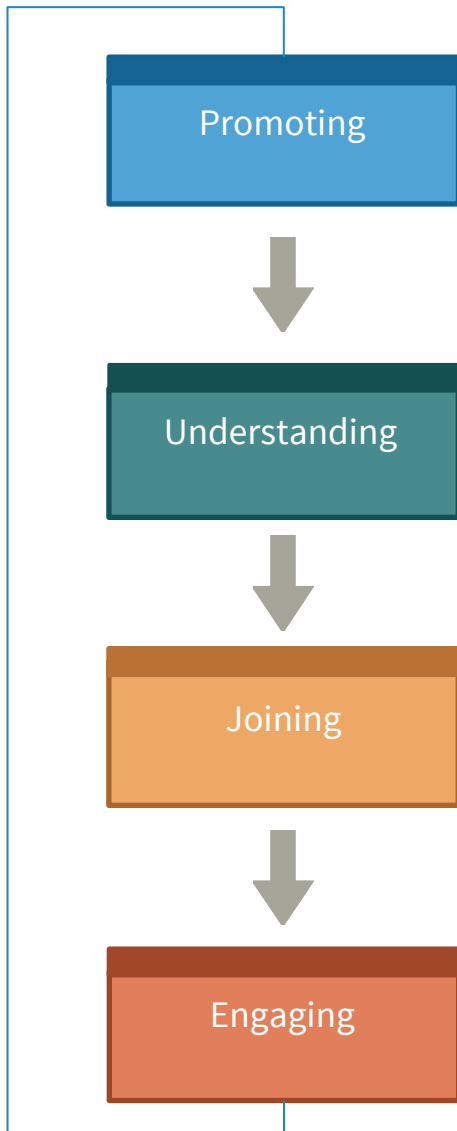

ICANN At-Large welcomes different people from different backgrounds all with one interest, HOW THE INTERNET AFFECTS THEM.

The At-Large Community represents the interests of Internet end users in ICANN activities as they relate to the domain name system (DNS). These include policies that

- govern how people can register and use domain names,
- ensure local languages are available as domain names,
- govern your country code Top Level Domain (ccTLD) and
- govern how generic Top Level Domains (gTLDs) are made available worldwide

By being a part of the At-Large Community, you can help shape these policies being developed by ICANN's multistakeholder community that affect current and future Internet users.

The What? Why should I care?

Many end users, Academia, Civil Society, Consumer Groups, Enthusiasts, members of our existing At-Large Structures that are part of the ICANN At-Large Community:

- don't have an understanding of what these terms means.
- may have misconceptions of what these terms means.

Hence

- No understanding or appreciation of the issues involved ;
- The attitude 'it does not affect me so why should I care?'

We saw the need to develop a series of ordered lessons/presentations that:

- can form a toolkit for At-Large Community members in educating the wider public
- At-Large Structure (ALS) representatives can use to educate members in their organisations in getting persons in their organisation to care about ICANN issues and become more involved in the At-Large Community.
- can be available online and offline for ease of use and access.

The Internet, what is it..?

- The Internet is a network of networks that interconnects devices to exchange information.
- In order to “talk” to each other, all of these devices must have a unique numerical address called an Internet Protocol address or IP Address. An example of an IP address is 94.127.53.132
- When you visit a website from your browser, you are requesting the website from your device’s IP address to the web server’s IP address.
- However, you don’t type in the ip address of the web server, rather the domain name of for example www.google.com
- In so doing, you have queried the DNS.
- So what is this DNS????

- It is a challenge to describe explaining the DNS in a simple, yet in a precise, concise manner and find good visuals.

Policy Summary

- Every year, millions of individuals, businesses, organizations and governments register domain names. Each one must provide identifying and contact information which may include: name, address, email, phone number, and administrative and technical contacts.
- This information is often referred to as “WHOIS data.”
- WHOIS service is not a single, centrally-operated database. Instead, the data is managed by independent entities known as registrars and registries. Any entity that wants to become a registrar must earn ICANN accreditation.
- WHOIS data is key for fixing system problems, maintaining Internet stability, and enhancing the accountability of registrants.



Why should end users care?

- The “one-size-fits-all” disclosure of identifying information may also expose registrants, especially individual registrants, to potential spam, phishing, and identity theft.
- Due to its implication in privacy, data protection, policing, security, and malicious use and abuse, WHOIS matters to end users, especially individual registrants.

Who is the At-Large Community?



Volunteer Community, with over 200 organisations and individual members around the world that represents the interests of individual Internet users in ICANN activities

Who is the At-Large Community?

Any group that supports individuals' ability to share their views on ICANN issues can be a part of the At-Large Community. These include

- Professional societies (e.g. engineers, attorneys, etc.)
- Academic and research organizations
- Community networking groups
- Consumer advocacy groups
- Internet Society chapters
- Computer user organizations
- Internet civil society groups

Groups that become accredited by ICANN are called **At-Large Structures** (ALSes).

If you belong to such a group, you can encourage the group to [apply online to join the At-Large Community](#).

Individuals can become members of the At-Large community by:

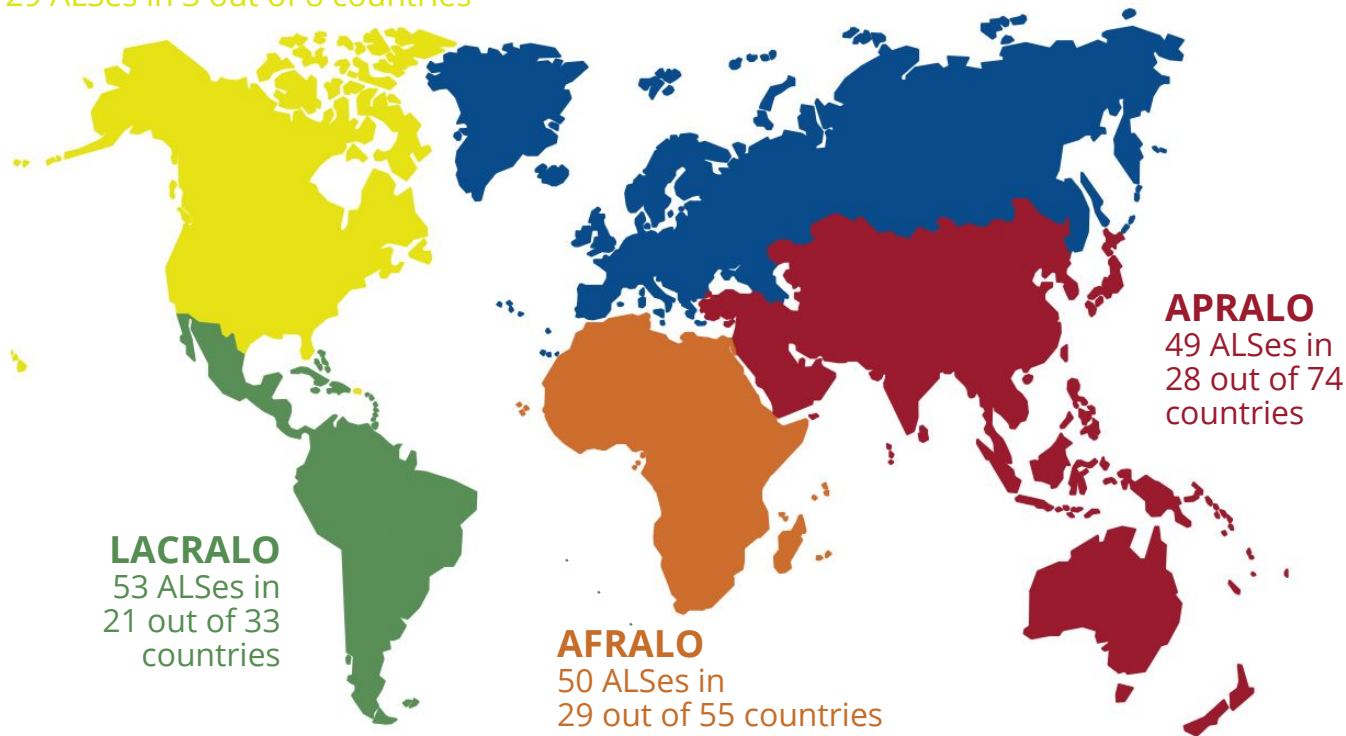
- Becoming a member of an At-Large structure (ALS)
- Joining directly as an individual member.

At-Large Community Organisational Structure

(2 from each RALO)



5 selected by Nom Com to serve on the ALAC
(1 from each region)






Seat #15 on the ICANN Board is selected by the ALAC and the At-Large Community

Key activities done by the At-Large Community

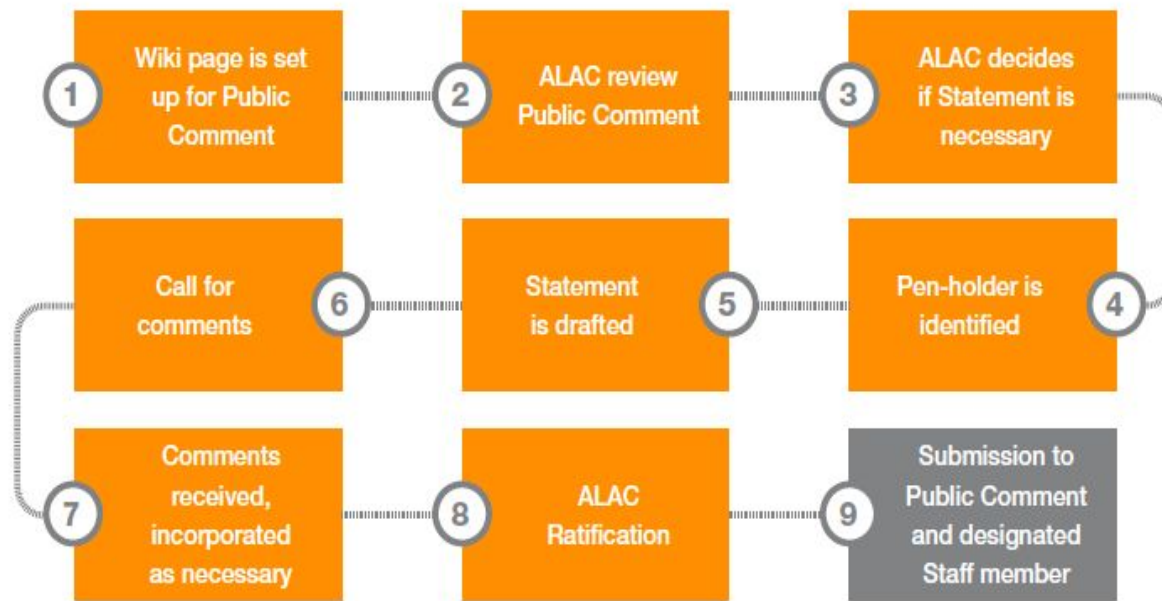
The At-Large Community has the duty to understand, defend, and advocate for the interests of global Internet end users in ICANN activities.

To fulfill this duty, we focus on three areas of work:

-  Comments on ICANN activities
-  Policy Development
-  Organisation Building

Policy Advice Development - The At-Large Advisory Committee (ALAC) publicizes, analyzes, and advises on proposed ICANN policies and decisions that reflect the views and needs of individual users at regional and global levels via ICANN's [Public Comments](#), which allows the community to comment on proposals initiated from ICANN staff or Working Groups.

At-Large Community members can draft position statements on behalf of the ALAC, comment on draft statements, and engage in policy-focused activities. See <https://atlarge.icann.org/policy-summary>
