


The ICANN Community At Work

The Bottom-Up Multistakeholder Model

The collective efforts of the ICANN community culminate in a common shared goal:

A single, interoperable Internet supported by stable, secure and resilient unique identifier systems

Who makes policy at ICANN?



- The three Supporting Organizations:
 - GNSO Generic Names Supporting Organization
 - ccNSO Country-code Names
 Supporting Organization
 - ASO Address Supporting Organization
- Approved policy recommendations are sent to the ICANN Board for final decision/ratification



What ICANN does NOT do



- Regulate Internet content
- Control spam / Internet security apart from domain name system (DNS) issues
- Regulate financial transactions online
- Law enforcement agency (e.g. consumer protection, data protection, intellectual property)
- Provide e-commerce, e-education, egovernment services



What are some examples of policy that has been developed by ICANN?



Address Supporting Organization (ASO):

- Allocation of IPv6 blocks to regional Internet registries
- Post-exhaustion IPv4 allocation mechanisms

Country Code Names Supporting Organization (ccNSO):

Internationalized Domain Names (IDN) ccTLDs

Generic Names Supporting Organization (GNSO):

- Uniform Dispute Resolution Policy (UDRP)
- Inter-Registrar Transfer Policy (IRTP)
- Principles, Recommendations & Implementation Guidance for New gTLDs





Remit	Substantive policies relating to generic top-level domains (gTLDs)	Global policies relating to country-code top-level domains (ccTLDs)	Policy issues relating to the operation, assignment, and management of Internet addresses
Where does policy development happen?	At ICANN	Some at ICANN, most at national level	Regional level



 - Governmental AC http://gac.icann.org/
 - Security and Stability AC
 - Root Server System AC



What are the Tools and Mechanisms used for Policy Development Support?

- The Working Group model
- Meetings: in-person, teleconference, virtual
- Public comments are critical
- Online collaboration mechanisms
- Regular publications & briefings
- Webinars & updates



These tools all support

bottom-up, consensus policies and guidelines



Examples of Current Policy Development Work

A few examples of ongoing policy work

No global policy under discussion currently in the ASO:

Policy discussions first occur at Regional Internet Registry (RIR) levels

Current ccNSO policy work includes:

 Drafting Teams working on Charters for possible Policy Development Processes (PDPs) on a review mechanism for decisions on delegation, transfer, revocation and retirement of ccTLDs; and policy recommendations for the retirement of ccTLDs

Current GNSO Policy Development Processes (PDPs):

- IGO-INGO Access to Curative Rights Protection Mechanisms (initiated June 2014, Initial Report just published for public comment)
- Next Generation gTLD Registration Directory Service (RDS) to Replace WHOIS (initiated Nov 2015)
- New gTLD Subsequent Procedures (initiated Dec 2015)
- Review of All Rights Protection Mechanisms (RPMs) in All gTLDs (initiated Feb 2016)



Important (and lesser known) facts about GNSO participation



- Anyone can participate in a GNSO Working Group
- Anyone can join a Working Group as a Member or Observer
- Participation in a GNSO Working Group remains open throughout the lifecycle of the project
- Much policy development work occurs regularly throughout the year, not just at ICANN meetings
- Although attending an ICANN meeting is useful, all Working Groups conduct their work via conference calls, mailing lists and virtual meeting rooms
