

Summary

Highlights

There were about 360 visitors at the booth during 11 March – 16 March 2017. Newcomers, Fellows and NextGen alumni, and general participants were all welcome to visit, engage and network at ICANN 58 Booth!



The Number of visitors per day was recorded by estimation from 9.00-13.00 AM to 13.00-17.00 PM. ICANN 58 Booth original schedule was planned to operate until Wednesday 15 March. However, it seems like we couldn't get enough of the booth! So, we continued to operate on Thursday by hosting our last special guest in the morning. The most visitors were on the Opening Ceremony day. On average, there are more visitors in the afternoon.

- Connect Newcomers with ICANN staff, experienced ICANN fellows and the global stakeholders engagement team (GSE) to share experiences, learning activities and networking opportunities

ICANN Information Booth aims to provide a welcoming, informative environment where experienced Fellows and NextGen can focus on Newcomers engagement track. In this environment, volunteers can share their previous ICANN experiences and enjoy what ICANN newcomers engagement would look like? What ICANN does and doesn't do? Why is it important for new voices/all voices to be engaged? How "easy" but challenging and rewarding the volunteer experience can be?

ICANN fellows' coaches and NextGen signed the booth coverage sheet and also guided ICANN 58 Newcomers through the Meeting Week's sessions. They arranged networking opportunities so that the ICANN Meeting Week is more effective and fulfilling. The booth volunteering experience provided a positive and lasting impact on ICANN Newcomers first encounter with the ICANN world, thereby, encouraging the continuation of ICANN newcomers journey as an active ICANN Community Volunteers.

ICANN Information Booth at ICANN#58 is located right next to the Registration Desk. The location of the booth was also an opportunity to welcome not only Newcomers but also everyone who need to ask for information, direction, or to share their wonderful ICANN experiences at the booth.

Keys Success Factors


- Guidance from Fellowship Coordinator Team




ICANN 58 Booth Visitors were asked to response to 10 short questions as shown. There were 46 forms returned and summarize as follows:




1. Number of times you attended ICANN Meetings (46 responses)




2. What is the Region you are coming from? (46 responses)




3. Are you involved in any of ICANN structures? If yes, which one? (46 responses)




4. How did you fund your ICANN 58 participation (41 responses)


Where are you coming from Map

Newcomers were invited to pin their location on the map to see the distribution across the globe!








Appendix

Notes and Suggestions

- ICANN information booth needs a structure in the form a board/management to run the future activities for upcoming fellowship program.
- A Literature rack is needed in various sizes to make space tidy and get efficient provision of info for every constituency.
- A more efficient coordination with the Global Stakeholders Engagement (GSE) team on 'when' and 'how' to choose appropriate slot for the (GSE) for their networking activity prior to the ICANN booth onsite set up.
- Rolls ups, flyers, flipcharts and any other materials that do not reflects ICANN constituencies content or ICANN related topics/themes are not permitted to be inside the booth(Keep an eye)!
- Ask for better level ground & access to a sustainable Internet connection for the online promotion of the Booth activities via videos, twitter, Facebook highlights & the booth can be set up quickly & should be best kept undercover.
- Diversify the activities and games at the booth, newcomers like to be entertained but do not let people eat at the booth and leave their stuff. Use highlighted messages and address rule of contact before setting up your booth.
- Use a diplomatic attitude with stranger/ guests who might step into the booth but do not let people grab any materials at the booth (flash disks, ICANN anti-stress ball, stickers, flyers...)
- Make sure NextGen, ICANN fellows and Coaches Sign up for a slot, but maximum at 3 volunteers
 at a time. Make sure they rotate and cover the booth the whole time, at least one of the booth
 leads, if the other attending a session.
- Use creative games, surveys, let the newcomers, meet new faces and share your great
 experiences that are really awesome and leave the space for people to network, run activities at
 the booth and to express themselves.
- Try to use and disseminate questionnaire, acronym names, meet ICANN superstar activities. Use a map to locate where your newcomers are coming from. This will help create a dynamic in the booth and engage more newcomers to facilitate their understanding of ICANN remit/mission.
- Do not forget to divide tasks and to devote time for you and continue your ICANN constituency engagement by dedicating time to go to ICANN constituency sessions or different working groups.
- Start planning your schedule during that busy week to make sure you don't miss the session of your interest and also manage to enjoy social events and the city.
- Do not forget to pose, press a button, stretch & let the camera do the rest message from your guests and never forget that the Booth experience is the ultimate ice breaker & guaranteed fun for all ages.

- Let newcomers talk about your event & booth and how much fun it was for years to come and use extensively social media and twitter to highlight your activities at the booth.
- Use <u>Keyhole: Hashtag Tracking for Twitter, Instagram and Facebook</u> and
 http://www.mecodem.eu/mecodify/ to track social media newcomers engagement then
 provide them with prices (ICANN crystal ball) for the recognition of their efforts and
 engagement at the booth, ICANN constituency structure, public forums and different WG.
- Last but not least, work with a spirit of collaboration not competition and never be afraid to say I don't know. Ask your colleagues, fellowship coordinators and experienced fellows if you can't provide information for newcomers.
