<b>Initial Responses (summary – for full responses, see <a href="#">here</a>)</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Yes - having the agency within ICANN, at arm's length, literally, is the easiest way to solve that issue.</li> <li>• A review could be useful (in addition to external Audit) and it should</li> <li>• Reviews are important, as mechanisms to improve, be transparent and plan for future development. They offer opportunities for innovation, steer direction, fine-tuning strategy. A combination of internal and external reviews is desirable to capture a multi-faceted process. Review processes should not be used to change purpose without the support of the same community that provided the original mandate – if this is deemed necessary, a community process should be used.</li> <li>• Involving the community would be important.</li> <li>• This could very well be considered to apply as a 'safety mechanism'. It could serve as an intermediate quality-check which could result in immediate corrections, for example cancelling remaining grants.</li> </ul>
