Report on CROP Trip to ISOC Asia-Pacific Chapter Leaders Meeting

(16-17 Nov 2017, Singapore)

1. Introduction

Internet Society (ISOC) organizes annual meetings of its chapter leaders in different regions of the world. The 2017 APAC Chapter Leaders meeting was originally proposed for Myanmar, and was later moved to Singapore on account of the ongoing turbulence related to Rohingya refugees in Myanmar. The two-day event had the first day dedicated to capacity building for Chapter Leaders, while the second day was a Workshop entitled "Building Trust in the Digital Economy: A Moving Target", where experts were called in to present on the topic.

Satish Babu, Chair of APRALO, participated in both the events and provided an important outreach on APRALO to ISOC Chapter Leaders.

It must be noted that because of ISOC policy of providing funding to a particular chapter leader only once in three years, most of the participants were new leaders. Therefore, although many ISOC Chapters are also APRALO ALSes, only one official chapter representative was a participant in the APRALO GA held at Abu Dhabi. Two other GA participants (Suhaidi and Satish Babu) did participate in the ISOC meeting, but not as official ISOC representatives. In other words, this was an opportunity for APRALO to reach out to a younger set of emerging leaders in the region.

2. Objectives and Achievements of CROP Trip

ISOC is an important partner for ICANN At-Large, and the co-operation between ISOC and ICANN At-Large is a long-term relation. However, official representation in each others' events has not been happening in Asia-Pacific, and this particular event was one of the first.

The objectives of the CROP Trip and the accomplishments are provided in the table below:
