Greg Shatan:"Swede Spot"?

Olevie [NPOC]:thank you Elsa

Greg Shatan:I don't want to make a snap legal judgment, but I don't think ICANN owes a fiduciary duty to the contracted parties....

Anne Aikman-Scalese (IPC):The complete suspension of the enforcement of the RA provision re WHOIS does not appear to be compliant with or necessary to comply with the GDPR as explained in the European Commission letter of January 29 or the letter of December 11 from the Article 29 Working Party. The Commission pointed out in its letter the availability of approved Codes of Conduct. To quote the Commission - "Rather than offering "binary" solutions whereby data processing operations such as access to the WHOIS system are either allowed or prohibited, data controllers and processors can work within this framework to develop pragmatic solutions, for instance by trying to differentiate between those categories of data that CAN BE MADE PUBLIC (emphasis mine) from those which cannot."

Anne Aikman-Scalese (IPC):The European Commission also said: "As the GDPR only applies to personal data of natural persons, in a first step, a distinction should be made between data that fall within the scope of the GDPR and other data elements." Based on the Article 40 language re approved Codes of Conduct, it appears that ICANN should be working with the DPA in Belgium to obtain an approved Code of Conduct due to the location of its office in Belgium as suggested in previous advice to ICANN. If ICANN is prepared to "adopt a Model" because they are "forced to do so", it would seem prudent to treat that Model as a Code of Conduct to be approved as recommended by the European Commission.

Anne Aikman-Scalese (IPC):Obtaining an approved Code of Conduct would likely make things much easier if the threat of numerous lawsuits by different DPAs were actually to come to pass.

Claudia Sellli:but would not the country be chosen on the basis of the main establishment,? meaning where the processor or controller is based or where the processing is happening? Would that be Belgium?

Anne Aikman-Scalese (IPC):Article 29 Working Party letter of December 11 says "One Stop Shopping" will be available. However, this requires that ICANN admit it is a joint data controller. That would facilitate a solution. From the Article 20 Working Party letter of December 11 - last Paragraph:

Anne Aikman-Scalese (IPC):Should ICANN be considered as a joint controller, it would also need to comply with the requirements of art. 4 of the current Data Protection Directive. This notably means that ICANN must either indicate one or more relevant establishments in the EU, or appoint representatives in the Member States. It is up to the data protection authorities to decide which party they will address if there are joint controllers. From 25 May 2018, ICANN may benefit from the one-stop-shop principle in the GDPR, and suffice with the appointment of one lead establishment or one representative in the EU. The DPA in this Member State will then be the lead DPA and the point of contact for ICANN.

Mary Wong:All three of the GNSO PDPs that have been launched since January 2016 have well over 100 members each (plus dozens, and more, observers)

Cheryl Langdon-Orr (CLO):well said Paul! we need to look at 'In-Service' training as well as new outreach for diversity

Mary Wong:Specifically, a rejection petition must contain rationale "based on one or more significant issues that were specifically raised in the applicable public comment period(s) relating to perceived inconsistencies with the Mission, purpose and role set forth in ICANN's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws, the global public interest, the needs of ICANN's stakeholders, financial stability, or other matter of concern to the community." (per Annex D, ICANN Bylaws).
