Universal Acceptance



Definition

Universal Acceptance (UA) ensures that all **domain names**and **email addresses** can be used by all Internet-enabled **applications, devices** and **systems**.

Software and online services support Universal Acceptance when they offer the capabilities listed above for all domains and email names.

What Does "Universal Acceptance" Mean?

Universal Acceptance (UA) is the state where all valid domain names and email addresses are accepted, validated, stored, processed and displayed correctly and consistently by all internet-enabled applications, devices and systems. Due to the rapidly changing domain name landscape, many systems do not recognize or appropriately process new domain names, primarily because they may be more than three characters in length or in a non-ASCII format. The same is true for email addresses that incorporate these new extensions.

The Universal Acceptance Steering Group (UASG), established by Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN), is a communityled, industry-wide initiative working on creating awareness and identifying and resolving problems associated with the universal acceptance of domain names. The purpose of these efforts is to help ensure a consistent and positive experience for internet users globally.

Registration Industry

Domain

Policy (qTLD) Registries and Registrars have an agreement with ICANN. Some Country Code TLD Coordination (ccTLD) Registries also have an agreement with ICANN, some ccTLDs are governed by local authorities. All TLDs maintain a relationship with IANA who administers the root DNS. The Root DNS as a shared global **RESOURCE Root DNS** resource. The Root DNS is a master list of all Top-Level Domains (TLD). IANA Registries operate as producers (or Registry manufacturers) in the Domain Registration Industry. Registries ICANN operate under an agreement with **Backend / Tech Providers PRODUCER** ICANN and/or local authorities, and are responsible for maintaining the authoritative list of domain names Front-End / (e.g. example.tld) within the TLD **Consultants** they operate. / authority) Registrars act as distributors in the ccTLDs Domain Registration Industry. Some Registrar Registrars operate as retailers, some operate as wholesalers and offer domain registration services through **DISTRIBUTOR** resellers and agents. Registrars operate under an agreement with ICANN and/or local authorities as well as with **Agents** the Registry. Resellers/Agents have agreements with Registrars. Registrants are consumers in the Domain Registration Industry. Registrants often provide content and services Registrant to Internet users through their registered domain **CONSUMER** names. Some registrants offer their domain names for Secondary Market / sale in the secondary market. Registrants have an agreement with the registrar or reseller/agent (including **Trading Domain Names** if they acquired the domain in the secondary market). Hosting and Internet Service Providers maintain the **SERVICE** content and services offered by Registrants. While they Hosting (DNS, Web, Email etc.) & ISP are not in the Domain Registration Industries, some **PROVIDER** reaistrars also provide hostina services. The Internet User accesses information (e.g. website) & **END USER** services (e.g. email) online through their ISP to Internet **Internet User**

hosts utilizing domain names (e.g. www.example.tld).

ICANN is the global policy coordination body for the Internet's root DNS. All generic TLD

Universal Acceptance ready

- * Accept, Support, Use and Show Unicode.
- * Store Information in UTF-8.
- * Accept Strings up to 256 characters.
- * Validate as little as possible.
 - * Verify TLDs against authoritative table.
 - * Query domain name against DNS.

Universal Acceptance ready

- * When developing app / service, or operating a registry, consider languages supported.
- Perform code reviews.
- * Check code points that were not defined when application / service was created.

Universal Acceptance ready

- Consider mixed-script addresses become more common.
- Convert non-Unicode to Unicode before display.
- * Use Unicode IDNA Compatibility Processing to match user expectations.
- * End user should see "everyone.みんな" vs. "everyone.xn--q9jyb4c."



3 Core Sectors


× 5 Mobility Vectors

= 15 Components


× 4 Dimensions Each
